CHICAGO, Aug. 9-(AP)—The \$62,000 American Derby, to be decided at Washington Park tomorrow, saps up as the biggest puzzle of the 1940 turf season. Six three-year-olds were named today to go to the post, but three of these—Colonel E. R. Braley's Bimelech, Mrs. Ethel V. Mars' Galahad and Charles C. Fisher's Sirocco—have beaten one another in major races this season. This situation promises to turn tomorrow's race over the 1 1/4-mile route into a scramble.

Two other three starters are from the Pacific coast. They are Charles S. Howard's Moland, fourth in the Kentucky Derby and second in the Fractions, and William B. Simpson's Weight Anchor. The third is Super Chief, owned by the Denmark Stable of Chicago. Super Chief's only outstanding triumph this season was victory in the Arkansas Derby.

Past performances indicate the kind of perplexing puzzle this race may be. Galahad defeated Bimelech, Sirocco and Moland in the Kentucky Derby.
