FAMOUS RAINMAKER DROWNED IN NORTH (Canadian Press) WASKESIU, Sask., Aug. 4—An ancient Indian known as Old Frederick, who gained quite a reputation as a weather prophet and rainmaker, perished when his canoe upset in north Saskatchewan Lake. Long a picturesque character on the Montreal Lake Indian Reservation near here, the 83-year-old Indian was said to be able to make weather forecasts for the white man. It is related he fell into an old tree branch which penetrated his left eye. He was taken to hospital but escaped and refused to return. Thus the feasting would never be healed and was said to have stimulated a nerve sensitivity accounting for his ability to forecast weather conditions. Three years ago Old Frederick is reported to have offered to cause sufficient rain to put out forest fires in return for four plugs of tobacco. Twenty-four hours later rain put out the blazes. He complained he still had three plugs coming to him on that deal and threatened never again to intercede for the white man. Only when the mercury hovered far below zero would he consent to remain indoors. On several occasions search parties had to be sent out for him in the dead of winter and found him on the verge of freezing to death. "What man talks much and do nothing—Indian work first, talk afterward," he once remarked.
