BRIGHTON, Eng., Oct. 2.—(By Geo. Hamilton, Canadian Press correspondent)—Palestine will remain a national home for the Jews; British evacuation of the Rhineland will be complete by December 14; no pledges have been broken in securing agreement with Russia on exchange of ambassadors and a new treaty with Egypt will be made when the people of Egypt signify they are in support of any Egyptian government. These were cardinal points of an outline of the Labor Government's policy on the outstanding Foreign and Empire questions of the day, given by Right Hon. Arthur Henderson, Secretary for Foreign Affairs, to the Labor Party's annual conference here today.
