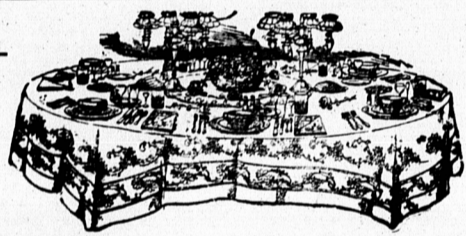

THE VALUE OF SQUARE MILES.

There has been much boasting in forty years past of our Canadian square miles. The vast area of our country has been proudly compared with Europe which is almost equal and with the United States which it exceeds. We have boasted that while the British Empire covers one fifth of the land surface of the Globe, Canada constitutes more than a fourth part of the area of the Empire. Obviously we set a value and all the world sets a value upon territory. Observe, too, how nations have contended and fought over boundary lines and little bits of territory. Think of our long contests with the States over the Oregon boundary and the Alaska boundary.

Again, at what price could Canada purchase that portion of Maine, which nearly cuts the Dominion in two and which many Canadians believe honestly belongs to Canada. Untold millions would not buy it. More than forty years ago the United States bought Alaska from Russia, for seven millions of dollars, all of it far north, and nineteen twentieths of it north of latitude 60. But Alaska could not be bought from the United States today for one hundred and fifty millions of dollars. Suppose that Prince Edward Island wanted to buy Anticosti or the Magdalen Islands from Quebec, to piece out our scanty square miles, what would be the price set by Quebec?

Again, what is the value to Ontario of the territory added to that big Province since the Union of 1867? In minerals and lumber, to say nothing of fisheries and the much-talked of agricultural clay belt along the Transcontinental, the new Ontario is vastly richer than the old. Think of the riches in the solid silver mines of Cobalt, where a lake bottom, all under water was sold by the Ontario Government for a million dollars. The territory added to Ontario down to date since the Union of the Provinces could not be bought back for a hundred millions of dollars. And in this past division of the public area which has gone to Quebec, Ontario

and Manitoba, the Maritime Provinces, though joint owners therein have not been considered at all and have got nothing.

Now by the will of the Government and a subservient majority the area of three or four European Kingdoms is to be further given away to Ontario, Quebec and Manitoba. These vast areas constituting the latest gift to the big Provinces are 786,000 square miles, are approximately equal in extent to France and the German Empire taken together and doubled in size. That is, France has 202,000, Germany 208,000 square miles. The Government of Canada is now proposing to give 786,000 square miles away to Quebec, Ontario and Manitoba, more than half of it to Quebec.

True, this land is but little of it agricultural land and is far north. But how many Cobalts and Sudburys does it contain? What is its mineral wealth, its lumber wealth, its fisheries and resources in the Hudson Bay? Each of these new areas has a large frontage on the waters, the smallest parcel 700 or 800 miles of coast line, and Quebec's portion more than twice as much. And is it so far north? St. Petersburg, the capital of Russia, is in latitude 60, and that parallel cuts through the northern half of Hudson Bay. Nineteen twentieths of the vast territory about to be given to Quebec, Ontario and Manitoba is south of the latitude of St. Petersburg.

Bear in mind also that Hudson Bay is known to be very rich in fisheries. Moreover Canada is about to connect these waters with the Pacific Provinces by railway at vast cost, and we are taught to believe that the Hudson Bay route is to be the great water route of the future between the North West and Europe. What then will be the value of these vast territories, fronting on Hudson Bay and now handed over to the three Provinces? And with it, we are told an additional subsidy in cash is to be paid to Manitoba!

This vast territorial spoil, almost continental in proportions, is more than fifteen times the size of the Maritime Provinces taken together. It equals in area three hundred and ninety times the size of Prince Edward Island. A territory so vast that the three Maritime Provinces would make but a little patch, and Prince Edward Island would be but a dot on its surface. It is really amazing that this can be done at all. That it is being done without any hint of compensation to the Maritime Provinces and almost without protest from any quarter, this is doubly astonishing.

THE LATE D. L. HOOPER.

General regret is felt and expressed for the death of Major D. L. Hooper, which occurred at his home yesterday morning after a prolonged illness. He was widely and favorably known for his earnest and faithful interest in civic and political affairs, as well as in mercantile military and fraternal circles. For over fourteen years he had represented Ward Five at the Council Board, and was for some years down to February last the efficient Chairman of the Finance Committee. His claims to the Mayoralty were generally conceded to be very strong at the last civic election, but the hand of disease was already upon him and he felt com-

elled for that reason not to enter upon a contest to which his physical strength was unequal.

Major Hooper was the son of George and Mrs. Hooper of Milton, and was born at that place on September 16, 1854. He graduated at the Charlottetown Business College in 1875, and entered upon his business career which he conducted on principles of fair dealing and honesty, and won the respect of all. He entered the militia service in 1873, and rose step by step to be position of Paymaster of the 82nd Regiment with the honorary rank of Major. Some years ago he was appointed Sergeant at Arms of the Legislative Assembly, and in that responsible position commanded the respect and esteem of both political parties. Major Hooper had a very wide acquaintance throughout the City and Province in connection with the various offices he held and his membership in the Masonic and Orange fraternities.

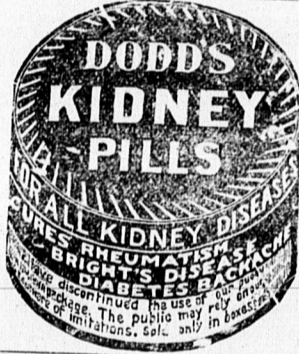
He was a good citizen, faithful to every public and private trust, and his removal from life's activities at the comparatively early age of 54 years is universally regretted. He married early in life Miss Robinson of Robinson's Island, with three children, James Parker, Muriel and Vera, are left to mourn a worthy and affectionate husband and father. The Guardian joins with the entire community in respectful sympathy with the sorrowing family.
