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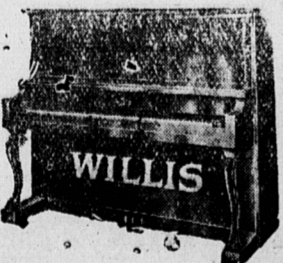

The "Wenzel," a single-breasted tunic named after its designer, won a competition organized by the Geneva Union of Hotel and Restaurant Employees, a body that controls a great number of Continental servants.

Liberal Conservatives Hold Big Convention

Enthusiasm and unity of purpose marked the Liberal Conservative Convention held in Centreville Bodeque Hall on Saturday afternoon, June 16, for the purpose of nominating candidates to contest the Fourth District of Prince Edward in the coming provincial elections. The different polls of the District were well represented. Mr. John Myers, of Hampton, was nominated unanimously to contest the Fourth District as councillor, moved by Mr. Louis Howatt of Tryon, seconded by Mr. J. R. McManus, of Kensington, while the voting for Mr. Heath Strong of Summerside and Mr. J. W. Bentley of Kensington resulted in a tie.

The chairman, Mr. A. E. Farrow, having the casting vote cast his vote for Mr. Bentley. Mr. Strang, who did not seek the nomination moved that Mr. Bentley be nominated to contest the fourth district for Assembly, seconded by Mr. J. Reeves, Freeport. Nomination unanimous.

After the business of the Convention had been despatched and a number of short, spirited speeches delivered by a number of the delegates present, the newly-chosen candidates in turn rose to express their appreciation for the honor bestowed upon them by the delegation present, representing the Fourth District. Mr. Myers, leading, appeared in his old-time form and declared that while he did not seek the nomination and would accept it only after repeated delegations had waited upon him, he would, if elected, see to it that the confidence and trust which the electors of the Fourth District had invested in him would not be betrayed. After a short and well-pointed address Mr. Myers concluded amid great applause.

Mr. Bentley spoke briefly thanking the Convention for the honor bestowed upon him, assuring the delegates that if elected he would do all in his power to uphold the traditions of the good old Conservative party. Mr. Bentley was warmly applauded.

Following this Mr. Edwin Dawson, Cape Traverse, seconded by Mr. James Pendergast, Kensington, moved a strong resolution denouncing in the strongest terms the deceitful tactics of the Bell party during their election campaign. Their ruthless taxation schemes and mingling of scandalous stories and shamefully broken promises, and expressing exquisite confidence in the honesty and purpose and legislative abilities of the Conservative leader, Mr. J. D. Stewart, K.C.

Mr. Adrian Arsenault, Summerside, who happened to be present, spoke briefly but eloquently on the resolution condemning the Bell tactics in strong terms. After complimenting the convention on their excellent choice of candidates to contest the coming election in the Fourth District he assured them that in the Conservative leader, Mr. J. D. Stewart, they had a man of ability and honesty of purpose—a leader in whom they could not help but feel proud. (Applause.)

Mr. Arsenault was followed by Mr. Murdoch Kennedy, M.L.A. Mr. Kennedy, in eulogizing Mr. J. D. Stewart, assured his hearers that they need not be afraid of the Conservative Leader deceiving the electorate, for Mr Stewart did not know how to deceive. The speaker scathingly denounced the Bell election tactics of deception and promises which were never intended to be filled and related how questions of vital importance to the people of this Province were asked by Opposition members on the floor of the House, and the Bell party rather than expose their doings, refused to give answers.

After denouncing the borrowing of immense sums of money amounting to hundreds of thousands of dollars, by the Bell party and squandering it on dirt roads to the advantage of relatives and friends, Mr. Kennedy concluded amid applause.

Mr. J. D. Stewart, K.C., was then called upon to speak, and as the Conservative Leader reached the platform he found himself entwined in an ovation which reminded one of a tax-burdened people who had suddenly found their eyes from iniquitous taxation and broken pre-election promises. Into the face of a man whose honest straight-forward maintenance bespoke clean government and fair play.

In beginning, Mr. Stewart expressed great pleasure in seeing such a well conducted convention of the Fourth District. Never in the history of our Province had there been such a contest for the overthrow of a government lacking purity and a sense of duty as at the present time, and he felt confident that the lady voters would exercise their franchise in such a way as to trample down such tactics as practiced by the present Bell party, and use their influence in bringing about free and responsible government.

Referring to Mr. Bell's denial of his pre-election promises on the floor of the House, Mr. Stewart explained that owing to a parliamentary custom an hon. member of the Government may deny a charge made in the House by another member, even though the accused member be guilty. His denial must be accepted. But, he assured Mr. Stewart that those who are here in Centreville Hall today, did Mr. Bell make those promises which he now denies, here in Centreville Hall in the course of his election campaign?

Yes! Yes! Yes!—from all over the Hall: Bell promised no increase in taxation.

Mr. Stewart then quoted the Bell pre-election resolution which is furnished in the House of Legislature.

- 1. Our claims must be brought to bear at Ottawa.
2. Decrease in cost of Falconwood.
3. Increase in teachers' salaries without increase in taxation. Mr. Bell, when in Opposition, there must be no increase in taxation until our claims were gotten from Ottawa.
4. Mussels mud from Richmond Bay spur line; have you farmers received much of this mud?
5. Assistance to the fisherman be same as the farmers. What assistance, queried Mr. Stewart, have you got? Increased taxation! Is that assistance?
6. Gratuities to returned soldiers. Yes, continued Mr. Stewart, the same assistance as has been given the farmers. The Bell policy—a policy of deception, and deception breeds deception.
The Bell party's first stroke of deception after getting into office, was their alleged deficit. The greatest deception ever attempted upon the intelligence of this Province, declared Mr. Stewart. The speaker then reviewed the Bell course of creating the alleged deficit. Neglecting to collect the revenues rightly belonging to the Arsenault Government, etc. Not allowing an outside independent audit of the books before they ever opened them. Why all this asked Mr. Stewart, \$190,000 collected since alleged deficit out of the Arsenault regime. I leave it to the intelligence of the electorate to answer, said Mr. Stewart.

If we are ever to pay off our debt, we must press our claims at Ottawa. Premier Matheson opened his first session with a \$100,000 check from Ottawa, and left the door open for more claims, and Mr. Bell, when in Opposition, never stopped criticizing the Conservative Government for not pushing it as they should for more. Messrs. Bell and Johnston claimed that all that had to be done was simply to take it to court and our case would be won. Where are those gentlemen today who claimed it was but a simple matter? Where are those courts? What has Mr. Bell done for our claims at Ottawa? Mr. Bell, said Mr. Stewart, practically admitted on the floor of the House that he had no intention of pressing our claims; that so far as he was concerned with claims he was through.

The Conservatives, said Mr. Stewart, had made an honest attempt and had gotten a \$190,000 for all time to come, they had increased teachers' salaries without increasing taxation. When the Conservatives went out of office there were 9 vacant schools; later under Bell Government there were 90 vacant schools.

Concluding, Mr. Stewart said we are today fighting an aggregation which will stop at nothing. With respect to my policy, I have no elaborate policy to offer. I believe the time has come when the people are looking for something more than policy. They are looking for good, clean government, with economy practiced in all departments. And if given the Government one of my first reforms will be the repeal of that iniquitous Bell invention—the poll tax. (Applause.) To reduce seasonal indemnities and reduce the cost in all departments. We want efficiency, declared Mr. Stewart, and we want no extravagance such as was connected with the Bell highways, and the imposition which it will cause to be placed upon our people. The highway scheme and extravagance will place the next government in the awkward position of providing for the sinking fund to pay for upkeep of those dirt roads. I am not here, continued Mr. Stewart, to make Bell promises, and until our financial condition is disclosed I cannot tell what can be done. But just as soon as conditions will admit we will reduce taxation. After complimenting the Fourth District on their choice of candidates, and assuring them that in Mr. Myers they had a man in whom they could place full confidence, a man of outstanding abilities, as well as a man of honor, who had no doubt but that Bentley would prove a worthy representative also. Mr. Stewart concluded amid great applause. —Secretary at Convention
