Functions of this kind do much to smooth the relations between employers and employees and if more generally taken advantage of would overcome much of the unrest so prevalent in the world today.

SUGAR.—The prospects are for much higher prices, says the Maritime Merchant. During the past fortnight an advance of 55 cents a hundred pounds occurred, which puts granulated up to over 10-12c. At the same time there are other countries not so well off for sugar as we are that are willing to pay 11 and 12 cts. a pound. If it were not for government restrictions, the chances are higher than it is on this continent. Present conditions will probably continue until next May when it will be pretty well known how European countries have got along in sowing. If they succeed in making large sowings, the price may recede; otherwise, it may be higher than ever next year. The refineries are not at present delivering any yellow or granulated in small packages. They will not just now sell for future delivery, and wholesalers are unable to carry any surplus stocks. At present there is almost a sugar famine west and the Government has asked the local refineries to send a large amount there which will tend to keep deliveries back in this market.
