**Resumption Of Relations Is Suggested**

MOSCOW, July 5.—Tentative and unofficial moves are being made to reopen the question of formal diplomatic relations between the United States and Soviet Russia.  
Acting alone and in a private capacity, Colonel Frederick Pope, New York industrialist, has presented to officials here a suggestion that, the United States Government send an unofficial commissioner to the Soviet Union as a preliminary to possible negotiations for the establishment of normal relations between the two countries.  
The Associated Press has reason to believe that his proposal was received with favor.  
Colonel Pope laid the matter last night before a special meeting of men high in the councils of the Soviet Government. Among them were V. I. Meshauk, Vice Chairman of the State Planning Commission; V. V. Oslinsky, head of the Central Administration of the National Economic Control; E. V. Rubinin, head of the United States Department of the Commissariat for foreign affairs and Karl Radek, the country's foremost international political commentator.  
It was learned that Pope discussed with them "satisfactory" conversations he held on the subject in certain quarters in Washington just before sailing for Russia late in May. The details of these conversations were not disclosed.  
In view of the reception accorded this proposal in Moscow the next move probably will depend on the outcome of his Washington negotiations.

**BRITAIN WILL**

of today was followed by introduction in the House this evening of the "Irish Free State Special Duties Act" itself. The measure was given nominal first reading but will be debated tomorrow on second reading, when the Parliamentary Labor Opposition will move its rejection. The move for rejection has no chance against the Government's overwhelming majority.  
The British Labor party, strongly opposing what it terms economic warfare, declares the Irish Free State has not defaulted the land annuities, although a payment of \$1,500,000 due to the national debt commissioners on June 30 was not made. George Lansbury, Parliamentary Labor leader, pointed today to the announcement of the De Valera Government is paying the annuities into a separate fund pending arbitration and declared:  
"That seems to me to sweep away all question of either default or dishonesty or breaking of any agreement. The Labor party desires to refer the matter to the Imperial try feed."

**TOURIST PARTY FROM ONTARIO HERE JULY 19-20**

A large motorcade of Upper Canadian tourists is expected to invade the Maritimes this week. The tour has been arranged by Mr. R. W. E. Burnaby, Maritime Trade Commissioner at Toronto, with a view to stimulating the tourist trade in these Provinces. The motor tour, formed of individual cars, left Quebec City yesterday and the itinerary has been carefully planned so that the tourists will have every opportunity to see the beauty spots and points of historic interest in the three provinces.  
The party will reach Saint John Friday noon and leave again at 5 for Hampton, where after having dinner, they will proceed to Moncton and the night will be spent there. They will leave Saturday morning en route to Nova Scotia, stopping at Sackville to be welcomed by representatives of the town and shown through Mount Allison University. Lunch will be served at Aulac, near Fort Beauséjour, and points of interest about the old forts will be visited. The visitors will leave Aulac for Amherst, Parrsboro, Truro, Wolfville, Yarmouth, Lunenburg, Halifax, and other points in the Sister Province.  
They will again enter New Brunswick on Tuesday, July 19, driving to Cape Tormentine to connect with the ferry for Prince Edward Island. Here they will visit Bordentown, Charlottetown, Cavendish and Summerside.  
At Charlottetown the party will lunch at the Canadian National Hotel and a reception on behalf of the City and Government will be held for the visitors, after which they will have the opportunity of seeing points of interest in and about the City. They will dine and spend Tuesday evening at Beach Grove Inn, where they will breakfast Wednesday morning before starting for Cavendish Beach. They will lunch Wednesday at the Clifton Hotel, Summerside, where they will be given an official welcome. Leaving Summerside at 4 p. m. they will take the ferry at Borden at 5:15 and will spend the night at Shediac, N. B.  
Thursday, July 21, will find the visitors at Chatham, Newcastle, Bathurst and Campbellton, where they will spend the night, leaving there at 8 a. m. the next day for Rimouski, Que., and the tour of the Maritimes will be concluded.

**SUCCESS ATTENDING FIELD DAYS**

The four field days held this far at Experimental Stations throughout the Province have been very successful, and have been marked by large attendances, and by splendid interest. The attendance at New London was 100; at Richmond 26; at St. Peter's 60; and at Red Point 60. The field day at the latter station was held yesterday afternoon on the farm of Mr. Nelson Stewart.  
At each station a careful survey was made and the methods employed were explained by Mr. R. C. Parent. Of special interest was the early cutting of red clover, and the thorough preparation of the seed bed.  
At New London the speaker was Mr. Stewart Wright, who gave an instructive milk testing demonstration. Mr. Lewis Roper also gave a live stock demonstration. At St. Peter's, Mr. Irving, sheep and swine promoter, gave a demonstration of sheep drenching for control of worms. Mr. F. A. Driscoll, discussed poultry parasites.  
The Experimental Farm truck with its six demonstration panels was on exhibition at each station. Each panel represented some treatment or process which has been carried out successfully at the Farm—the treatment of poultry for parasites, growing of fodder corn, the result of seed drill sowing, experiment on time of topping turnip treatment of grain for smut-treatment for sheep ticks.  
Nine more field days will be held during the present month at the various stations.
