Mr. James Paton, M. L. A., received letter to-day from his son, Lieutenant Rowland Paton, dated August 5th. As has been announced, this gallant young officer was severely wounded and is now in a Hospital in France. He writes that he is feeling fairly well and is gradually recovering from his wounds, the one in the leg being the more serious and requiring an operation. In the wrist the bullet went right through, but fortunately did not touch any of the bones. The bullet has been extracted from the knee. Lieutenant Paton expects to be in the Hospital for a while longer and later on will be transferred to England, and it may be, send home to Canada. Lieutenant Paton's superior officer in the 6th, writing to Mr. Paton on the 14th of the same month pays this exceedingly fine tribute to Lieutenant Paton:—"On the morning of the 8th, the Battalion went over the top and went forward for two whole days with the good results of which you have already read. Rowland was supposed to have stayed with the rear details as he was most anxious to go over with the boys and evidently prevailed upon the Colonel and got permission. He was unfortunately wounded in the left wrist and left leg. I sincerely hope the wounds are not serious and that his good services may not be required again. We have a large number of men from Prince Edward Island now with us. Captain Cook is our Transport Officer and is doing well. Lieutenant Blanchard (since reported wounded) is also with us."
