Welshmen Fall 10-4 Before Torrid Onslaught Of Lawlor Coached Team

Outskating, outchecking and outplaying their opponents most of the way, Walter Lawlor's Navy puckers last night clinched third place and a playoff in the City Hockey League when they defeated P.W.C. Welshmen 10-4 in a sudden death encounter at the Forum. Garnering a 3-1 lead in the first period and then increasing it to 4-1 in the middle game, Navy, after withstanding a determined Welshmen onslaught in the early part of the final session in which they yielded two goals, came back once more to outscore their opponents 3 during the session, and make their margin secure.

Just which team Navy will meet in the semi-finals depends on the outcome of the Saints-Legion tussle for first place and the result of the game between the two teams. Both teams resorted to a close-checking game in the first eight minutes of play with little action being shown, but two penalties to Wales and a hand pass to the Navy, in the next six minutes, regained the fireworks as Navy fired home two goals for a 2-0 lead.

Judge Retains Title Won Last Year; Good Racing Again Witnessed

Having just a little bit too much trotting ability for the other three entries in the field, Fred Lahey's Judge, from Dartmouth, Nova Scotia, yesterday afternoon trotted off with the trotting championship of the inter-province meet, capturing the first two heats and then being drawn after being assured that his crown won last year was still intact for another season.

Hal Britton, Lusticia and Jenny Kalmuck, representing Dartmouth, Charlottetown and Summerside were the other entries in the feature event and although Judge won going away the foursome provided stirring competition before the event was decided.

In the first heat Judge had two lengths to spare over Lusticia but in chalking up his race win and title in the second heat was offered plenty competition by Lusticia who came very fast in the last 30 yards to lose out by just half a length to the fast stepping Dartmouth entry.

With Judge drawn for the third heat Lusticia had a battle on her hands to ward off the threat offered by the fast stepping Jenny Kalmuck from Summerside, but managed to win the heat by a neck to the good.

That was the story of yesterday's main event in brief but in the other four classes another big sized crowd of fans saw racing of the highest order. In each and every heat they battled it out from wire to wire and today with all the non-winners being classified into separate classes for the final day's racing program fans should once again witness duels of speed in keeping with those which have been witnessed the past two afternoons.

Lynnmitie Shows Plenty Of Speed
 Class C. Pace provided even better racing than witnessed in the free-for-all when the Austin Tierney-driven Lynnmitie, after making a short break in the first heat came on to whip the favored Miss Cleo Dale in the next two heats to win the first Island victory of the day. In the first quarter-mile dash it was a nip and tuck battle all the way with Miss Cleo Dale coming on in the final few yards to cop the verdict.

In the second heat Tierney shook Lynnmitie up from the start to win by a length and a half and then the coil owned by C. H. Horton of Murray River showed his speed potentialities when he paced the quarter mile in thirty seconds to cop the heat and race with Miss Cleo Dale, a half and a half, again providing plenty of competition.

Cecil Drake, Halifax horse owner, chalked up his second win of the meeting when his Mary Stuart, after being beaten by Guy Spencer in the first heat came on in the next two to capture honors. In the first heat Spencer had just too much for the other six hearing horses. Mary Stuart showed her racing qualities in the second heat by winning from King Grattan, the runner up, in another good finish but in the third heat Guy Spencer again came into the picture and it was as pretty a battle to the wire as fans would want to watch as the Halifax-owned horse shaded Guy Spencer by half a length in a drive from wire to wire.

Wood Captures Second Race
 Following on the heels of the Wood of Southport gave the Victoria Driving Club their second winner when he piloted Robert Baldwin to a victory in the Class A. Pace, but only after all three heats had been raced in better than 31 seconds. Winning by length over the favored Reuben Lee in the first heat raced in thirty seconds, and then beaten by the Lee horse in the second, Robert Baldwin came back in the third to duplicate his first heat's time of 30 seconds and nip Marjorie Budlong for the heat and race. It was a great victory for the Wood-owned horse, especially when one has to take into consideration that Robert Baldwin was racing with a bad knee.

Third Island Victory
 Chalking up their third victory of the day that gave them a 5-2 edge and an 8-3 edge in the two-days of racing, Island horsemen saw Harold Cudmore's Just Ficks, as game a little mare as ever had a shot tacked on chalk up a straight heat victory in the Class B. Trot and Pace, the final event on the day's card. Although winning rather handsly in each heat Just Ficks had to show at her best to register her victory, being forced to pace the first and third heats in better than 32 seconds and just equalling that time in the middle heat.

The meeting which has produced the fastest times since these inter-province meetings, were originated and the closest racing concludes today and again we repeat that fans should see racing of the highest order.
