door. "Oh, God, there lay my two little girls murdered."  
Necla was bound hand and foot, and was lying on the floor under the edge of the bed. Cynthia was on the bed; a bloody rag covered her face. Examining the bodies, he found that they were stiff. He could not stand it, and left. Necla had on a khaki knicker suit and wore a dark blue sweater. Cynthia's hands were tied behind her back; her feet were not tied. She had on her fall coat and her dresses.  
Searched For Dog.  
He had looked for the dog after leaving the camp but could not find him. The dog had been bought by Williams for Cynthia before he had gone to the war. The dog would fight for the children. He had found the dog tied up in his barn on the next day.  
He had been to the camp twice or three times during the summer. He felt no concern at all for the children when they were in Williams' presence. They had gone down frequently three and four times a day.  
The magistrate asked Williams if he wished to ask the witness any questions. He said "No your honor."  
Murdered Girls' Sister Called.  
Hilda Foster, a daughter of Ward Foster, was called. She said she was 15 years old. She had been at school on Tuesday, November 25. They, Hilda, Necla and Cynthia, had left school at 4 o'clock. Deputy Sheriff Saunders.

PASSING THE BUCK TO THE CHILDREN.  
It is pleasing to note that the Dominion Government is at last taking some notice of the perilous condition of the Canadian forests, even if its first efforts are puny, childish and ineffective. In offering prizes to school children for the best essays of Forest Protection, the Government is running true to form and, as usual, starting at the wrong end of the problem. By the time the government gets the children educated on the necessity of forest protection, there will, if it continues its present policy, be no forests left to protect.  
It is not the children—God bless them—who are responsible for the forest fires and for the lack of proper measures of conservation, but the grown-ups and the government is itself the greatest offender. It is not the children who require educating but rather the members of the government themselves.  
Asking the school children to invent ways of saving the forests is in line with the appointment of a Royal Commission on Pulpwood to give the Government an excuse for not performing its obvious duty. Both are purely camouflage, adopted in the hope that the people will be fooled into believing that the government is sincerely interested in doing something for the preservation of our forests, while at the same time it is permitting their wanton exploitation for foreign interests and allowing them to take from Canada thirty-five million, mature trees every year. To replace this annual drain on Canada's forests would require the planting every year of four trees each by more than eight million people who would then have to fight fire, insects and fungi, and pay taxes and interests for a period of fifty years as well.  
The government is willing to do anything except to adopt the simplest, most practical and most efficacious means for conserving our pulpwood, that of stopping this foreign exploitation.  
Instead of trying to educate the children by offering cheap prizes let the government educate its own members into a knowledge of what the situation requires and what the Canadian people are demanding of them.
