M. P. H. A. WILL ALSO CHANGE RULES

MONCTON, Sept. 18.—It is reported that the Maritime Province Association intend to follow the examples set by the National Hockey Association and the Coast League in putting into force a number of new hockey rules which will help to improve the national winter game, according to the Halifax Echo. The chief rule which the Maritime Province League intend to give a try out in the rule regarding the petty offences. The National Hockey Association and the Coast League intend to give a new rule doing away with petty off-sides in centre ice a thorough trial this winter. This rule according to the officials of the N.H.A., will make the game faster. It is their intention to make a line sixty feet from each goal net, and between these lines no petty off-sides will be called unless a man is loafing offside and takes the puck.

MANGLED TO DEATH IN A GRAIN SEPARATOR

TRUAX, Sask., Sept. 17.—A fatal accident occurred five miles north of here yesterday, when Metaphore Martin, son of Gregory, Martin, a farmer while working on the separator on a threshing outfit, fell into the cylinder and was mangled so badly that he died instantly. From the meagre details available, it appears that Martin fell into the separator from the top. It is also stated that the separator caved in beneath him and thus precipitated him into the cylinder.

INSPECTS ULSTER ARMY

BELFAST, Ireland, Sept. 17.—Sir Edward Carson, the leader of the Irish Unionists, landed in Ireland today with the object of inspecting the volunteer army which is being raised in the Province of Ulster to support the provisional government which, it is said, is to be brought into existence in the event of the Home Rule for Ireland bill becoming law. The Ulster army is said to be thoroughly organized and already have attained a strength of about 100,000 men, which number is expected by its leaders to be nearly doubled when recruiting has been completed.

DOMINION HOTEL MEN IN WINNIPEG

WINNIPEG, MANIT., Sept. 18.—It is estimated that more than three thousand hotel men from all parts of the Dominion are in attendance at the annual meetings of the Dominion Hotel Men's Association which opened here today for a session extending over a period of four days. Many suggested reforms in the interest of the trade are to come up for consideration and discussion.

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 18.—Fred C. Thompson, former all-round national amateur champion and the world's premier athlete, will be ordained to the Presbyterian ministry this month, when he will assume the pastorate of the Hope Presbyterian Church in Eagle Rock Valley, a suburb of this city. He is already occupying the pulpit of that church on Sunday, having been a licensed minister for some months.

Thompson is one of the youngest preachers in the denomination. He was an undergraduate at Occidental College when only sixteen and graduated before he was twenty years of age. He is only twenty-three now and has since taken his degree at Princeton Seminary.

"Athletics are neither a vocation or an avocation with me," he declares. "Sport for sport's sake I cannot but regard as belittling. I have never followed it in that spirit. In fact, I cannot really say that I have ever followed athletics at all. What I have done has only been for exercise, and I look upon it as followed for any other purpose as aimless."
