Mexicans Retire Before Rebels

(Special to The Guardian.)
WASHINGTON, April 26.—Mexican Federal forces have retreated to 48 miles north of Mazatlan before the rebel troops of General Flores, dispatches to the Government said today. A struggle between Federal and Revolutionist forces for control of Mazatlan, the principal port of entry of Sinaloa and regarded as the chief industrial and commercial city of the west coast of Mexico is imminent, according to these reports.

CONFERENCE NEARING A CLOSE

SAN REMO, April 26.—The Conference of the Council of Premiers which started a week ago with threatened serious dissension over the question of unified allied attitude toward Germany, will end probably tomorrow night with apparently complete accord. While not all questions have been settled, outstanding differences have been eradicated and the ground prepared for important work when the Premiers resume their work in Paris next month.

The Council today decided to tender a mandate over Armenia to the United States in the event that the nation refuses. It is believed here that the Council then will ask to determine the boundaries of the new nation by deciding whether the Armenian district shall go to Armenia or remain Turkish.

The mandate over Palestine went to Great Britain who with France will settle the borders of Syria and Palestine, especially as to whether the upper Jordan river shall be included in Syrian borders.

SAYS CANADA'S SWEEP CLEAN OF POTATO SUPPLY

MONTREAL, April 26.—An American buyer invading Canada in droves to buy up every potato that can be discovered? The assertion that they are doing so is made by local dealers who give this as the greatest reason for the high price now being paid here by the housewives for the family supplies.

Here is the way a dealer sums up the situation:

"It is almost impossible to get potatoes anywhere in the province of Quebec, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick or Prince Edward Island now. The Americans have sent swarms of buyers into the dominion and there are four or five men bidding for everything that is available. One United States buyer told us he had got five car-loads at \$5.75 per bag, f. o. b. in Prince Edward Island; another said he had found eighty cars for Pittsburg at the same rate. I tried to get two cars for Montreal in Prince Edward Island. After a long time I got them at \$4.75 f. o. b. there for a bag of 90 lbs. It costs about 75 cents per bag to bring them to Montreal, making the cost here about \$5.50. But the real reason why Montrealers are paying such enormous prices now is that the country has been swept clean of its crop by the Americans and so it has passed over the border."

MAJOR COLLISHAW IS IN ENGLAND

LONDON, April 26.—Major Collishaw, the famous Canadian, arrived in London yesterday after nearly a year in southern Russia, where he commanded the Royal Air Force. The rest of the 47th squadron, which was mostly composed of Canadians, arrived also.

Major Collishaw had many harrowing experiences and was reported missing for six weeks. During that time his comrades thought he was in the hands of the Bolshevik forces, but it developed later that he was a victim of cholera. He was found by a Russian nurse, in a hut, not many miles from where the squadron with Deniken was trying to reach Moscow, and she nursed him back to health and strength again.

They were 800 miles inland when the army succeeded in turning the Bolsheviks and the journey back he characterized as a nightmare. They lived in railroad coaches and time and again were roused and had to turn out to rescue comrades from the blazing wreckage of cars which had been set on fire by "red" spies.

When he started on his return journey, Major Collishaw had a wonderful 12½ carat diamond worth \$1,500, but this was lost when "reds" set fire to his coach and he escaped with only the clothes on his back.

He looks in the pink of condition despite his attack of cholera. Major Collishaw is the possessor of three decorations awarded by the Russian Government.

HATS INCREASE OR LESSEN THE HEIGHT

A short, stout woman should choose a hat with a crown higher on one side, as this will increase the height. The same effect is had by placing the trimming toward the back of the hat.

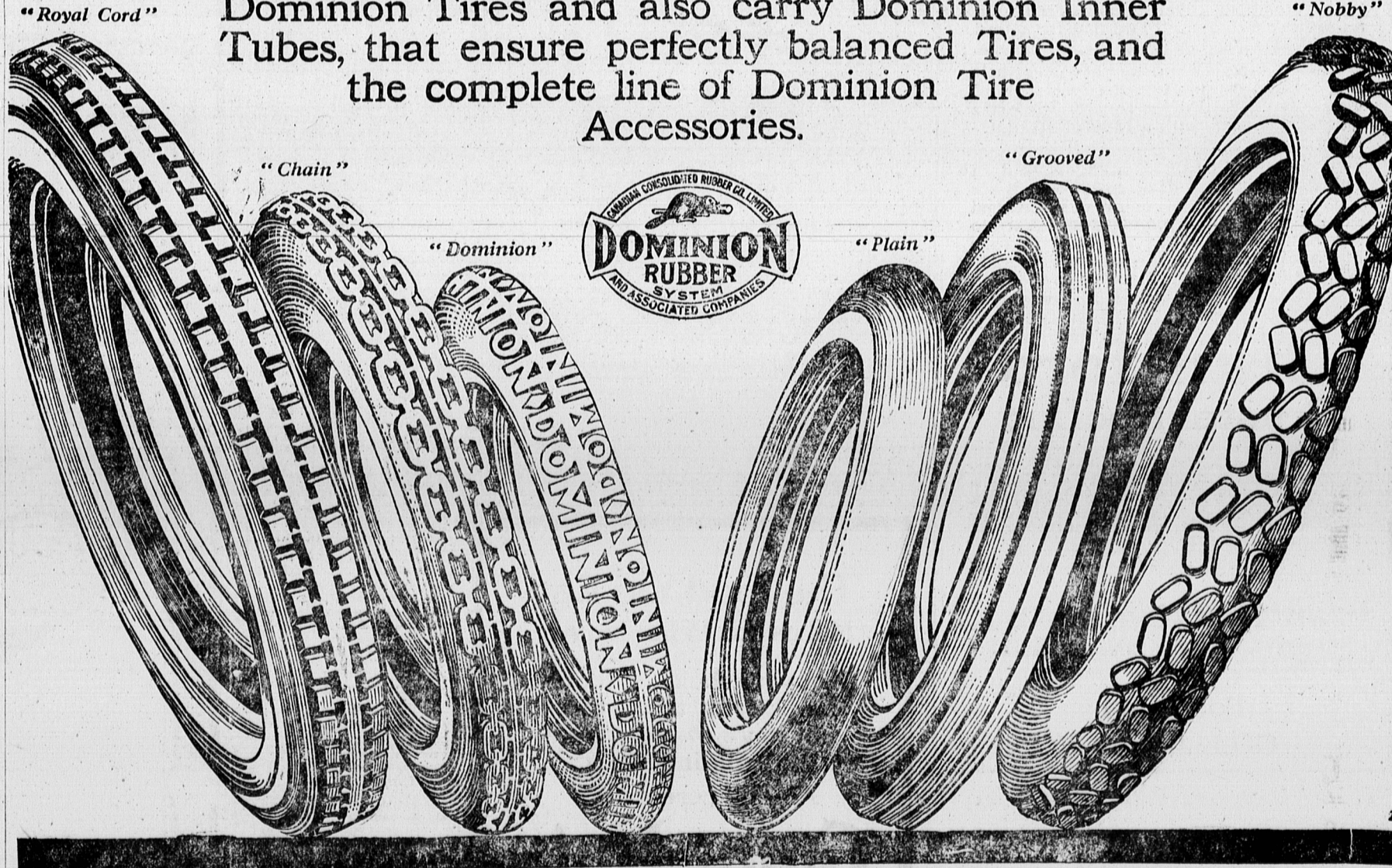
