After two hours had been devoted to the discussion of the work of the Society, the Governors and other officers were re-elected for the present year. At six o'clock all repaired to the dining hall of the College where a menu of particular excellence was disposed of. It was forehadowed that in future the annual meeting of the Alumni Society would be held at some time other than at the closing, during which time priests and members were very advantageous to close at some other time and the subject was made the matter of considerable discussion. All present were loud in their praises of the genial Bursar of St. Dunstan's College who had made all arrangements regarding the banquet which was so admirably carried out. The toast list was splendidly given by the speakers in response being of exceptional interest. The speakers were President Dr. Conroy, Rev. Dr. Morrison, Rev. Dr. Gauthier, Professor Gillis and James McIsaac.

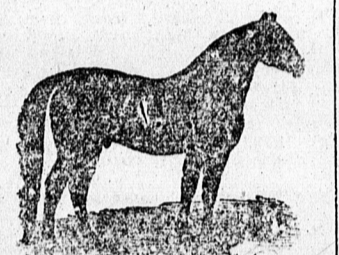
