Armada "Massacre" Now Gets Backing

While the British nation was recovering, at Christie's in London the other day, the famous Armada jewel, formerly the property of J. Pierpont Morgan, Ireland was lost.

After Spain's "invincible" armada, consisting of 132 ships and 3,165 cannon, had run the gauntlet in the English Channel and the North Sea, provided by Howard, Drake, Hawkins, Forbisher and others on July 21-29, 1588, the survivors tried to escape by rounding the British Isles through the northern passage, but were further decimated by a storm off the Hebrides, which drove some of the survivors onto the coast of Ireland.

The "Jericho" Parlour

The 400 year old building on the north side of the private courtyard of the Deanery at Westminster Abbey has just been cleared and limewashed.

In the tradition that later almost became history, the Iberians of the North resented this. They had not massacred the Spanish sailors but had rescued them, had received them into the families. Look, they said, at our handsome, dark-featured men and women—their descendants! Now, however, the story of the alleged massacre is being revived by the latest report issued by the Harvard University anthropological expedition.

The "Jericho" parlour was built by Abbot John Islip early in the sixteenth century, and it still contains its original fireplace and linoleum panelling. There is some fine Tudor glass in its windows depicting the royal badges, rose and portcullis. "Jericho" and "Jerusalem" are connected by a short passage, and a door in the south wall of "Jerusalem" opens into the abbey's hall, which is now the dining-room of Westminster School.
