NEW YORK, June 29 - Two families guard the name of a man whose letter caused Sidney L. Brewster to shoot his wife and kill himself. District Attorney Edwards admitted that the families of Brewster and his wife, together with a few county officials know the real identity of the person who signed the letter that was thought to have inflamed Brewster. Edwards said it was regarded unnecessary to reveal the name as the man is not criminally liable and there is a general official belief that he did not write with the motives apparently imputed to him by Brewster.

To Fix Date For Easter

GENEVA, June 29 - The League of Nations commission of experts on reform of the calendar has decided to recommend that the second Sunday in April be fixed as the date for Easter. The decision is subject to an agreement with the Holy See, which has not yet been reached at the last meeting of the Commission.

After the Chief Justice had delivered his charge to the Grand Jury the following motions were heard:

The Attorney-General moves that Mr. H. J. Anderson, Registrar of the Probate Court, be made a commissioner for taking affidavits in the Supreme Court with William T. Selinger. In this case Mr. Inman, K. C. moves that the submission to arbitration in the case be made a rule of Court, and the motion was granted. On the motion of Mr. Inman the Award left with the Probate Court was then filed. Mr. Inman then announced to the Court that the purpose of his motion was to set aside the Award, and he requested the Court to set a date on which to hear a motion for a new trial.

The Court set down the motion for Monday next as the time for hearing in the application.

Judgment was given in the following case by Mr. Justice Hazard and Mr. Justice Aeneas: Roy Pigeon vs. Harry T. Holman, in which a rule for a new trial was refused with costs.

Yeo versus MacFadyen, rules set aside, verdict for defendant, and a new trial granted, argued last Easter term. Justice today delivered the judgment of the Court, granting a new trial, Morley Bell and Inman, K. C. for plaintiff, Neil MacLeod, K. C. and Saunders, K. C. for defendant.

Hearing was then begun on the non jury debt or damage case of Russell H. Englis vs. John A. Lea, Heath Strong K. C., and J. D. Stewart K. C. for plaintiff, and E. H. Strong and J. J. Johnston K. C. for defendant.

The Grand Jury would also visit the public institutions, the asylum and infirmary and the county jail. Yesterday there was a fire at the asylum and His Lordship said he would ask the jury to make a careful inquiry into the circumstances of the fire. It appeared to have been due to lightning, but the jury should make a careful investigation for the purpose of putting on record what had occurred there at the outbreak of the fire; what the conduct of the officials in regard to serious nature of the fire should be an adequate, careful, and searching inquiry, not to see if anything had been wrong done, but to see if the officials had done their duty and make a record of it. This report might be of considerable and perhaps of great importance in the future.

Previously, said the Chief Justice, it had been a habit in recent years to hurry through the work of the Grand Jury. He was not sure that this was a good thing in looking over court records of fifty years ago His Lordship said that he had found at the Trinity Term of 1876 there had been a much larger number of bills of indictment, and that these had been of a more serious nature than those of the Grand Jury was now dealing with. But the Grand Jury at that time had taken more than a week to look into these bills. It had taken into consideration a number of other matters, had taken its business with great seriousness and had done it with great thoroughness. His Lordship said he was not suggesting that the present Grand Jury should extend its inquiries to such a long period, but would emphasize the point that its work required great thoroughness, and if it thought it needed more than a day for its deliberations it should take the necessary time.
