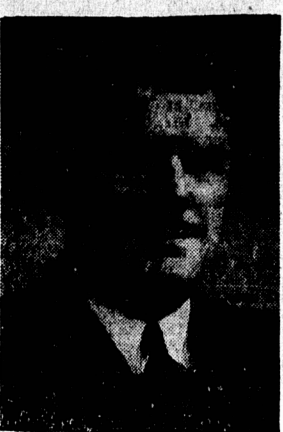

CHANGE OF RADIO INSPECTOR - Senior radio inspector for New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island since 1926, Mr. H. H. Brannen has been promoted to the position of assistant to the district superintendent, radio division, department of transport, East coast radio service, with headquarters at Halifax. The territory included extends from Labrador to the Bay of Fundy and covers radio installations over which the Dominion has supervision. Mr. Brannen will take up his new duties on February 10. His wife and family will remain at their residence in West Saint John until living accommodations can be obtained in Halifax. DEPLORES INCREASE IN DRINKING - At the monthly supper meeting of the Baptist Men's Association held Monday evening Dr. A. D. MacKenzie delivered an outstanding address on the subject "A Problem of Re-Education." Dr. MacKenzie dwelt on the futile efforts made in this and other provinces to "control" the liquor traffic. He deplored the greed for gain that made people condone the liquor business because of the revenue received. "We are grappling," said Dr. MacKenzie, "with a foe who is not only powerful but clever. Distillers in their advertising are posing as benefactors of men and promoters of ideal living, whereas in reality they are pouring life-wrecking poisons into the stream of life. Not every drinker becomes an alcoholic," said the speaker, "but through his influence he may act as a 'carrier', and cause another who is less strong to become addicted." He urged the following of St. Paul's example who said, "I will eat no meat." Mr. J.P. Gordon thanked the speaker on behalf of the Association. The men unanimously agreed to co-operate with the Church Choir who are sponsoring a recital of the great cantata, "Portia White," in Prince of Wales College Hall.

Refresher Course In Festival Music

On Jan. 30th, the Refresher Course, sponsored by the P. E. I. Musical Festival Association, concluded. It had opened on Monday afternoon, Jan. 28th, in the auditorium of Queen Square School, with an enrolment of eighteen, representing the districts of Brackley Pt., Charlottetown, Cornwall, Glenadale, Harrington, Kinkora, Montague, Mt. Mellick, New Glasgow, North River, Pownal, South Granville, and the convent of Mt. St. Mary's.

The course was inaugurated this year as a help to those engaged in the teaching of Festival Music, particularly those in the rural areas. It was arranged by the Refresher Course committee of the P. E. I. Musical Festival Association. The convenor of the committee, Mr. Malcolm MacKenzie, assisted by Mrs. J. P. Lantz, Mrs. Edwin Johnstone, Mrs. Elliot Full, and Mr. Raymond MacDonald, spent much time and effort in planning the working details.

Alcoholics Anonymous Overflow Convention

DETROIT, Feb. 2 - A co-founder of Alcoholics Anonymous said recently at the opening of the first international convention of the group, that it could be expected that at least 20,000 new members would be added to the roster in 1948, bringing the total to more than 80,000.

"Bill W.", as he is known within the ranks of the men and women who have come up from "skid row," said the estimated earning power of "A.A." members during the coming year - that of men and women who otherwise would be derelicts of society - would be about \$250,000,000.

"Bill W." mentioned this in a press conference to emphasize his contention that once a chronic alcoholic becomes a member of "A.A.", he becomes an excellent employment risk. More than 95 percent of the membership is working, he said.

The intensity of the membership here was demonstrated when 4500 members showed up for the initial convention session in a hall constructed to accommodate only 2500. Many were turned away and others stood or sat in the aisles.

"Bill W." pointed out that if the 80,000 who would, according to his account, be members of "A.A." by the end of the year, were still following the habits of past days, they would be public liabilities.

Because of the nature of the group, there will be no reporting of its activities. "Bill W." is as close as one may come to identification of a member.

About 2000 accredited delegates from Ontario and the United States were on hand at the meeting opened.
