THE LABOR DAY CELEBRATION

Keenly Contested Sports at the C. A. A. A. Grounds---Large Attendance Witness Excellent Contests---No Records Broken Because of Bad Weather Conditions.

Notwithstanding a cloudy afternoon and a drizzle for half an hour the Labor day sports at the C. A. A. grounds yesterday afternoon were entirely successful.

But one condition marred the gathering and to the few who during the afternoon created a bear garden on several parts of the grounds, a severe lesson should be taught; for if athletics are to maintain the high standard they hold in this Province and be patronized by the best people they must be dissevered from such drunken brawls as were witnessed yesterday afternoon.

The competitor in which most interest was taken was B J McDonald, the famous Marathon runner whose 25 mile record is 2 hours 42 minutes. In the mile he went against the Island record for that distance of 4 min 53 sec held by D A McKinnon but was not able to break it.

Libby of Sydney showed up well in the bicycle events winning the half and mile and Ruggles, the veteran Wanderer, was warmly welcomed. The absence of the fleet footed Halifax runner, Carney, Eaton, M. McCormack and others was regrettable; as their presence in several of the events would have made the competition much keener.

Halpenny and Donahoe were popular favorites and did excellent work. Brown neatly captured the half mile bicycle and

chased the Sydney man close in the others.

No records were broken but Donahoe on a heavy track equalled the Island record of 54 seconds in the quarter mile

RUSSIA AND JAPAN HAVE AGREEMENT

For Mutual Recognition Respecting Railway Rights

Each Power to Define its Rights and Have Authority to Guard its Railway--Assassin Threatens Lord Melbourne.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN RUSSIA AND JAPAN.

LONDON, Sept. 7--(Special).--The agreement between Russia and Japan is believed to contain an agreement for their mutual recognition respecting the railway rights of the two powers in Manchuria and Corea, each power to define its rights and have authority to guard its railways and send troops for the suppression of disturbances within its sphere.

JAPAN HAS EXTENDED RIGHTS.

THE YACHT RACES ON SATURDAY

The Micmac Wins Class "A" Race, Maple Leaf, Class "B" and May F. Class "C"--Rowing Races Hotly Contested--Great Afternoon's Sport and Deep Interest Taken.

During the past few years the great attention paid to field and track athletics in Charlottetown has decreased to some extent the interest in boating and yachting upon our harbor. This enhancing form of sport, however is not dead and such interesting and keen contests as were afforded the citizens on Saturday through the efforts of the Hillsboro Boating Club will soon raise the sport to the status it should occupy in a city possessing such facilities for this past time as Charlottetown has in its magnificent harbor.

Great interest was taken in the sailing and rowing races held during the afternoon. Peake's No 1 wharf which formed the starting point was thronged with spectators and the others along the waterfront had many interested onlookers while skiffs of all kinds flitted along the surface of the harbor and followed the contestants as they made their way along the course. The tug with the officials whose eyes were marked the passage of the white winged craft before the breeze.

The wind at the time of the first gun for a class was light from the north east but after the big boats had made the first round it freshened considerably--to such an extent in fact that the Micmac covered the second round thirty minutes faster than the first.

The course for the sailing race was as follows:--Starting from an imaginary line between Peake's No 1 wharf and stake boat anchored off its head, thence to stake boat off Railway wharf, thence around reg buoy at harbor's mouth, thence around stake boat at mouth of North River. This course was called over three times by A and B classes, distance 18 miles, and twice by C class, 12 miles. The time limit for A class was 4 hours, for B class 4 1/2 hours.

The first race called was class A, open to the Province. There were six starters; Micmac owned by Gaudet and Alys-worth, Charlottetown; Freda, F McDonald, Charlottetown. Vinco, Hughes & Lewis, Charlottetown; Janetta, Nathaniel Gay, Pownal; Learig, Roy Holman, Summerside; Prince Edward, Thomas Lund, St. Peters Island.

This race being the senior one--the most interest was taken in it.

At seven minutes past one o'clock the gun was fired, Micmac crossing the line first, the rest starting in the following order, Vinco, Prince Edward, Freda, Learig, and Janetta.

The Prince Edward passed Micmac shortly after the start and the boats rounded the first buoy, near new Hillsboro Bridge in the following order and time. Prince Edward 1:25.03, Micmac 1:29.15, Vinco 1:30, Learig, Freda, Janetta.

The Prince Edward led to the next buoy near Harbor's Mouth with Micmac second and Vinco third and rounded as follows: Prince Edward 1:55, Micmac 1:57, Vinco 1:58, Learig 2:10.30, Freda 2:15 Janetta 2:18.

To the third buoy up the North River, the Vinco nearly caught the Micmac and the Prince Edward gained over four minutes on the Micmac rounding at 2:10 Micmac 2:16.40, Vinco 2:17, Learig 2:31.30, Freda, Janetta.

Passing the starting line as they entered on the second round the Prince Edward was in the lead, with Micmac following closely. Just before they reached the East River buoy the Micmac headed her rival on a tack and they rounded as follows. Micmac 2:57.30, Prince Edward 2:59.30, Vinco 3:00.

On the leg to the buoy at the Harbor's mouth the Micmac gained one minute on the Prince Edward and nearly six minutes on the Vinco. The Micmac rounded at 3:16.30, Prince Edward 3:19 and Vinco 3:28.

The boats kept this position to the North River buoy with Micmac nearly five minutes in the lead, Prince Edward 3:32.4, Vinco 3:40.

From the North River buoy down across the starting line again to the buoy at the new bridge the Micmac gained steadily rounding fifteen minutes ahead of the Prince Edward who rounded at 4:13, Vinco 4:16.30.

On the leg to the buoy at Harbor's Mouth and North River the Micmac led.
