mission industries, Rasapura and

B. D. district superintendent of the
Canadian Bible Society, Edmonton,
Canada. The Kirk had been tastefully
decorated by their friends from
Rasapura and Mhow. Dr. J. M. W.
Ramsay and Mr. W. J. W. W. W.
of Rasapura, gave the bride away,
and Mrs. E. J. Drew played
Lohengrin's Wedding March. The
ceremony was performed by the
Rev. E. J. Drew, chaplain of the
kirk, assisted by the Rev. H. F.
Smith of Mhow. Later, Mrs. G. H.
Menzies, gowning in mauve, "nick-
nocked" the eighty or more guests
who came to the mission bungalow
to offer their good wishes and con-
gratulations to Mr. and Mrs. Gra-
ham. After the wedding feast and
propriate speeches, both witty and
wise, several friends expressed
their pleasure in the happiness of
the young couple. The Rev. D. G.
Cook of Rasapura, recently returned
from furlough and who had repre-
sented the home board in Cana-
da on the occasion of Miss Compton's
destination to foreign mission-
ary work, welcomed her to her new
sphere of service. Mr. Wesley High-
house of Rasapura, in fitting words
spoke for the Indian community
among whom Mr. Graham has labored
and assured the new mem-
ber of a hearty welcome among
them. The Rev. J. T. Taylor, in
a timely and kindly manner ex-

sion in the happiness of their two
young workers. In reply Mr. Gra-
ham conveyed his thanks and spoke

In P. E. Island

MONTAGUE.—The regular
