### TO PREVENT "CLEAN UPS"

From Cleveland comes word that the Grand Circuit stewards will be for the annual meeting in January work out some scheme so that it will not be possible for a trotter to sweep the early closing classes as Peter Scott did this year and as others have in the past.

Limiting the amount of money a horse can win does not seem to be for the best interests of the sport; neither is it well, perhaps for a horse to go all the way down the line plucking the first money.

The track managers of the circuit had it in their power to have given the public a series of great races if they had cared to pass up the chance for paying purses in the early closing trots.

After Peter Scott went out of the Circuit stable early in the campaign of 1914, there was a general desire to see the \$30,000 stallion meet Margaret Druien. Murphy held Scott over for this year, so the pair did not come together. An early closing \$5,000 2.06 trot last spring at two or three points along the circuit was won by Scott, but not a manager would baffle possible gate receipts for a race between them against the sure entrance money of a shower class.

A clash now and then with Margaret would have cut Peter's winnings quite a bit, and at the same time provided the public with a real race on the day the rich purse was for settlement.

"The average Grand Circuit track manager thinks of his public after he figures how much he can get for the looking after the other details," writes Frank Trott in Boston Globe. "First betting privilege and then comes the question as to how much entrance money he can hook owners for. After that the public is taken into consideration."

**REV. ROBERT T. DOBIE.**  
Rev. Robert T. Dobie, a highly esteemed Clergyman of the Church of England died at his home in Tryon on Monday morning last. He had been in failing health for some time and he died somewhat unexpectedly as he had been confined to bed only a few days.

Mr Dobie was born at Hightgate, London, England, in the year 1837. On completion of his students education at Islington he was invited to St John's, Newfoundland, by the late Bishop Field. After spending some years in that city as Vice-Principal of Queen's College and Bishop's Chaplain, he volunteered for missionary work on the Labrador coast, spending seven years on that field, when he returned to St John's to resume the pastorate. In the year 1873 he came to Prince Edward Island to take charge of Port Hill parish as rector, where he remained five, or six years. After spending some years in Nova Scotia as rector of several important parishes

he returned to this province, intending to retire from the active work of the ministry, but the Springfield and Crapaud parish becoming vacant he was invited to take charge of these parishes, where he remained for several years as rector and from which he was compelled to retire owing to failing health about six months ago. He was held in high esteem as a Christian minister by all denominations and much beloved by his parishioners for his faithful service and genial disposition. He was a scholarly Christian gentleman of the old school and an able and eloquent preacher.

His surviving relatives are his two sons, Messrs Hector D. and Cyril E. Dobie both of Port Hill and five grandchildren, also his widow, formerly Miss J. D. Reid, daughter of the late James Reid, sen., of Summerside. The Guardian tenders sincere sympathy to the bereaved.

The funeral will be held on Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock from his late residence at Tryon to Crapaud Cemetery.
