Herbert Downey Buys Young Colt AMHERST, Jan. 7 - Herbert Downey, well known local grocery man, has acquired the young stallion Belwyn Aubrey and intends to train the youngster this summer on the local track. The colt, which already weighs 1,000 pounds, will not be three years old until the early fall, and is regarded as one of the most promising horses ever brought into the town. The sire is Captain Aubrey, with a Belwyn-Axworthy mare as dam. The stallion has been placed in the care of Hal Coates, who originally trained Bingen Aubrey, the gelding that showed a test mile of 2:12-5 in Charlottetown this fall. Mr. Coates also owned the grey mare Tonita C, 2:15-4; Mudake, 2:10-4, and Black Bess, 2:17-2. Only a few weeks ago he bought from Thomas Eter a yearling, Josephine the Great, and will start training the filly early in the spring.
