LLOYD-GEORGE LAUDS DOMINIONS

Says Mother Country Watches With Pride Their Remarkable Progress

LONDON, June 3.—(Through Reuters Agency)—David Lloyd George, chancellor of the exchequer, at the Eighty Club dinner on Saturday evening, proposing our guests said: "We are gathered here to welcome the prime minister of the great self-governing dominions of the British Empire.

"We welcome them not merely for the great distinction of their careers, but also for the position they hold and the great people they represent. This is no party demonstration, none the less is it a demonstration, by a party of welcome.

"We regard the self-governing dominions with special pride. The conferring of self-governing upon the great communities of the Empire is the greatest of all achievements in the past. It has represented and obliquely dared even political ruin to confer freedom upon these great communities. We see with pride how they have grown in strength, influence, and power, but above all in the arts of self-government from which humanity can draw in settlement of its great problems, and as a party we feel we can share in the triumphant vindication of democratic government which they present to the civilized world. We also observe with a glow of satisfaction how, as they assume the form and attitude of independent communities, their attachment to the Motherland grows. Generation by generation, decade by decade, conference, by conference it flourishes. Year by year it has borne fruit, and will bear more abundant fruit in the future, for it has struck its roots deep into the rich soil of liberty. (Cheers.)

"There is no greater mistake that statesmanship can make than to imagine the narrow patriotism excludes the wider one. We have another special interest as Liberals in our self-governing dominions. We watch and watch with admiration the spirit of emulation of their blood social experiments (cheers), and it is an inspiration for us to see how the daring spirit of enterprise, of patient courage which transformed many a wilderness into a fertile province, how they are also inspiring the effort which is extracting humanity from the undergrowth of the social jungle in which it is tangled.

"In this land the growth is older and the dence fibre is sturdier, it is rarer. It is with difficulty and labor and toil that we can cleave our way through it, but we are doing it slowly, laboriously, until, I hope, at last we shall cut a way for humanity to march through to the light.

"This is an old country, not done with yet, (cheers), trade returns, census returns, even the living issues we are fighting upon the floor of the mother of parliaments, all show that this country has not yet come to the end of its great career.

"There are still chapters to be written which will thrill with nobler deeds than have yet been recorded even in its great past. The country which founded the greatest empire the world has ever seen means to prove that it can also rid itself of the social evils which undermine its strength and dim its lustre.

"The old country is not done, but if we are at the end of the greatness

GARRIOS SHOWING THE WAY TO BEAUMONT

GENOVA, Italy, May 30—Garriso took the lead in the Paris-Rome aviation race this morning arriving here at 8.50 o'clock well in advance of his rival, Beaumont. The latter had an accident en route, disabling his motor, but got under way again after making repairs. Both expect to go on to Rome today if the weather is favorable.

Garriso reached Pisa at 35 minutes past 12 and immediately left that city for Rome. Anxiety was felt at Genova as the morning passed without the arrival of Beaumont. From several quarters his passage across the French frontier had been announced, but after being sighted flying along the Riviera in the neighborhood of Alasio all track of the French aviator was lost.

Some persons think that Beaumont was forced to make another descent owing to a defective motor. Others make the risky supposition that he crossed the Mediterranean Sea going direct to Pisa without touching at Genova. The distance over sea between Alasio and Pisa is a little more than 100 miles.

The Italian battleships Regina Elena, Vittorio, Emanuele III, and Umberto, and a number of torpedo boats are scattered along the coast from Genova to the French frontier, and to Pisa for the purpose of aiding the airmen if necessary.

The Mayors of the villages along the coast have ordered boatmen to be ready to render assistance should any of the birdmen fall into the sea. Everywhere along the coast the greatest excitement prevails. Large crowds are gathering at points where the flyers can best be seen to greet them on their arrival.

ALBERTA VOTES FOR CHURCH UNION

CALGARY, May 31—"That this Alberta Conference, assembled in the city of Calgary, declares itself in favor of the union of the Congregational, Methodist and Presbyterian Churches in Canada, in accordance with the proposed basis, as possessing the elements of perfect agreement in matters essential and flexibility in things not essential in the departments of doctrine, policy and the ministry, administration and law and as being calculated to immeasurably advance our Saviour's Kingdom, particularly in the bounds of the western Conference."

After an enthusiastic and spirited discussion, the members of the Methodist Conference passed the foregoing resolution unanimously. All the members of the Conference who were qualified to vote on the matter to the number of 124, voted in favor of Church union. When the Chairman called for those who wished to oppose the motion not a single voice replied. The assembly burst into cheers, and when the applause had subsided the Doxology was sung.

WASHINGTON, May 29.—Theodore Roosevelt will testify in the investigation of the steel trust. Roosevelt is required as a witness committee of the house. A request has been sent to Mr. Roosevelt to appear and tell what he knows about the taking over of the Tennessee coal and iron company by the U. S. steel corporation. John W. Gales who was before the committee on Saturday contradicted practically all the statements in Mr. Roosevelt's letter to the attorney-general, which set forth that E. H. Gary and H. C. Frick had volunteered to avert a financial disaster by taking over the coal and iron company. Mr. Roosevelt will be asked to harmonize the apparent discrepancies.

INDIA'S POPULATION IS NOW OVER 312,000,000

LONDON, May 31.—The results of India's fourth ten-yearly census, which has just been issued, show that the last period has been one of great progress.

The total population of India is now 315,001,099, of which number 244,172,371 are in British India and 70,828,728 are in native States. The rate of increase since the census of 1901 has been seven per cent.

India has been subject to terrible calamities which have interfered seriously with the normal growth of her population.

"Thus in 1897 and 1899 there were two destructive famines, which were followed by desolating epidemics of cholera and typhoid. Plague appeared at Bombay in 1896 and rapidly spread all over the presidency and to other parts of India. It is estimated that between 1896 and 1901 half a million people died of plague, and practically arrested the natural growth of population.

More was to follow. Between 1901 and 1906 plague carried off six and a half million souls. Two million people died from the pestilence in the Punjab alone, one and a half million in the United Provinces, and thirteen hundred thousand in Bombay.

Plague has, in fact, proved far more destructive of human life than famine.

RECEIVES INVITATION

SACKVILLE, June 1.—The Board of Regents, of M. Allison have received that at effort be made to secure service of Rev. Dr. Campbell, of St. John, to assist Dr. Borden in a forward movement to raise an endowment of \$200,000 for the University.

It was also decided to offer Dr. Campbell, Professorship at University, the Executive to choose the subject which he should teach.

Dr. Campbell said that he would take the offer into consideration and give an answer in a short time.

OBITUARY

The Guardian regrets to chronicle the death of Malcolm D. Campbell which occurred at Mitchell River on Wednesday evening, May 24th. The deceased, who was sixty-six years of age, had enjoyed robust health, never having had a serious illness, previous to contracting the disease—measles—which caused his death.

During his last hours he was consoled by receiving the last rites of the Catholic Church, administered by his pastor, Rev. Dr. MacMillan, and surrounded by his devoted wife and family he passed peacefully away.

Mr. Campbell was born in South Uist, Scotland, and with his parents emigrated to this Island in 1842.

After coming to manhood, he engaged in farming, and by his industry and perseverance became one of the most prosperous farmers of King's County.

His funeral took place on the morning of the 27th, to All Saints' Church, Cardigan. The large number of people who assembled to pay the last marks of respect to an old and kind friend and neighbor gave ample evidence of the high esteem in which he was held. There were seventy carriages present.

The pall-bearers were Hugh MacCormac, John McIsaac, William Wilson, Henry Green, Harry MacCormac, and Alexander McMillan.

Besides a sorrowing widow he leaves to mourn two sons: Michael, residing in Mitchell River and Francis on the homestead; and two daughters: Mrs. James Fay, Newport, and Sister Agnes Aloysius of St. Mary's, Indiana, also an adopted daughter, Margaret, to all of whom is tendered sincerest sympathy. Mr. Oliver will be accompanied by Hon Mr. Paterson, one of the negotiators of the agreement at Washington.

Their itinerary has not yet been definitely arranged, but will include the chief centres of the West, covering the point at which Mr. Borden will speak.

ANOTHER JOLT.

OTTAWA, Ont., May 31.—The Yukon and White Pass Railway Co. has got another jolt from the Railway Commission. Some months ago upon complaints prosecuted by P. T. Condon, M. P. it was ordered to reduce its rates by about one third. It was given till the first of June to file its new tariff making provision for such relations. Meanwhile the company appealed to the Governor-in-Council, but the appeal did not operate as a stay proceedings. Recently it applied for an extension of time from June 1st., to November 25 for the filing the rates in accordance with the Board's ruling. This has been refused and moreover the company will be fined \$100 a day for every day it is in default after June 1st.—The date it was originally told to toe the mark.
