BUYING UP NEWSPAPERS.

One sensation follows another quickly in the political field these days. The resignation of Mr. Blair and the purchase of a prominent newspaper in Montreal have been noteworthy features of the campaign during the past few days. It is not likely that any or all of these events will have an effect upon the result of the political contest proportionate to the sensation which they have created for the time being.

A fortnight before polling day the great majority of the electors have probably made up their minds as to how they will vote, and by this mental decision the Government is already potentially sustained or beaten. Few of the number comparatively will reverse the decision already reached simply because some great man has resigned an office or will make a speech, or because one or more newspapers have changed their proprietorship and are blowing hot where before they blew cold.

The influence of a newspaper upon the public mind is nothing if not educative and the process of education is slow. It may also be observed that the elements of ability, stability and character are of importance. Without these no newspaper can have very wide influence. A newspaper which suddenly changes its principles, or which, having no fixed principles, suddenly espouses a cause on which it had before been silent, or to which it has been opposed, will carry little weight with its readers.

Just now a syndicate of which Mr. Russell is the representative appears to have added La Presse of Montreal to its holdings, which before included two St. John dailies. No one seems to know the precise object of these newspaper purchases. It is vaguely surmised that they represent some large corporate interest opposed to the Grand Trunk Pacific scheme. The time before the election is obviously too short for these latter purchases to effect much in changing the minds of the electorate. But it is important for the future that a

number of newspapers in two cities have passed under one control, with an object not fully disclosed, and that the transfer of one leading Montreal daily, and of one in St. John comes at a rather critical time in national affairs. We cannot believe that the Government exists by the sufferance of any one man or the support of one or two newspapers. If the Government shall be outvoted on November 3rd we shall take it as pretty conclusive evidence that it had lost the confidence of the country before Mr. Blair resigned from the Railway Commission and before Mr. Russell bought La Presse of Montreal. And we may also express surprise at the nervous manner in which certain Liberal organs have awaited tidings as to whether or not Mr. Blair will take the platform during the campaign. The country is still calm, even while newspapers are being bought and sold as swiftly as building lots under the auctioneer's hammer in the time of a boom.

It seems that the reported sale of the Montreal Herald as telegraphed abroad was a rather stupid hoax—a repetition of a stale joke. It derived its probability from the fact that on the eve of the election another Montreal daily had been bought by David Russell. Few newspapers have changed their proprietorship more frequently during the past twenty years than The Herald, and it was some time since reported that Mr. Russell was negotiating for its purchase. The readiness with which certain Liberal newspapers sell out on the eve of an election has not tended to brighten the party prospects.
