SOAP WANTED FOR WAR PRISONERS.—As a result of the war in Germany the prisoners are deprived of this necessary article. Will those who have adopted prisoners please send their men a few cakes of it from time to time, as this is one of the few things—except tobacco, which are allowed in private parcels. Put prisoner's name and address on the parcel, and be sure to add "Care of Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red Cross, 14, Cockspur Street, London, England." Send by parcel post. No postage is required.

RECRUITING IN BOSTON.—Men between the ages of 18 and 25 years who have a college education or its equivalent, are sought by a new department of the British recruiting mission in Boston, opened this week for the purpose of enlisting men for the Royal Flying Corps. Lieut. Allan N. O'Brien, a Canadian who has seen service with the corps in France, and who recently visited Charlottetown, is in charge of the department. Recruits will be sent immediately to training stations in Canada.

CONCERT AT COVEHEAD.—A very successful concert was held in the Methodist Church on July 4th under the auspices of the W. M. S. The pastor, Rev. J. L. Dawson presided. AN ANNIVERSARY.—Monday last was the 32nd anniversary of the consecration of the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception, St. John, N. B., when special services were held. The consecration of the cathedral took place on Thursday morning, July 16, 1885. The imposing ceremony was performed by Archbishop O'Brien, of Halifax; Bishop Rogers of Chatham, and Bishop Cameron of Antigonish. Other prelates attending were: Archbishop Lynch, Toronto; Archbishop Corrigan, New York; Bishop Sweeney, St. John; Bishop McIntyre, Charlottetown; P. E. I. and Bishop McMahon, of Hartford, Conn. All the prelates who took part in the ceremonies are dead.

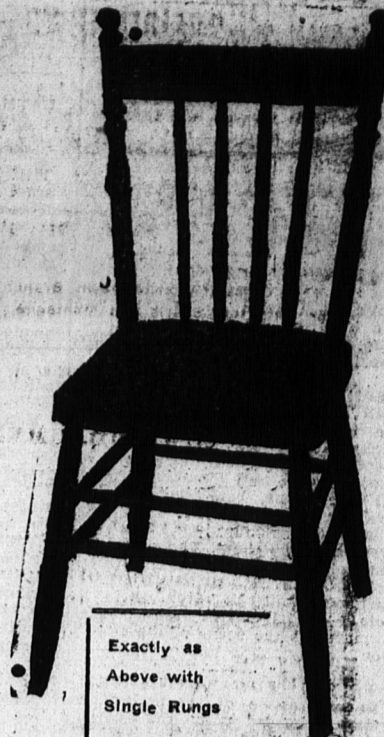
