The "Judas-Tree"

(By Dominion News Service)

LONDON, July 1.—In the Duke's garden at Kew a fine specimen of the Judas tree, or Cercis Siliquastrum, is in full bloom.

This 50-year-old tree, which flowers from all its wood, young and old, derives its name from a legend that it was upon the branch of such a tree that Judas Iscariot hanged himself after the betrayal of Christ. The Judas tree comes from the shores of the Mediterranean and Asia Minor. It is a member of the pea family, and has a pod-like fruit. It was brought to this country from Western Asia in 1596.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE PRINCE COUNTY HOSPITAL

The annual public meeting of the Prince County Hospital was held on Tuesday evening in the Town Hall at Summerside, the president, Mr. H. T. Holman, in the chair. A number of the trustees and citizens were present. Reports from the Summerside and Alberton Ladies Aids were submitted, read and, on motion of Mr. Chas. Hensley, seconded by Mr. J. A. Brace, received and adopted and it was ordered that the thanks of the meeting be tendered to the ladies for their very material aid to the hospital. The secretary submitted and read the financial statement for the year ending May 31st, 1924 as follows: Total Receipts \$16,114.00; Total Payments 16,114.00; Total Assets 79,885.58; Total Liabilities 79,885.58. After complimentary remarks the statement was adopted. The Matron's report showed that 471 patients were admitted during the year—202 male and 269 females. Of these 402 were cured; 11 improved, 9 unimproved; 13 were not treated, 9 died; 17 remain in hospital. Fifty infants were born in the hospital, of which two were still born. All 50 mothers made a good recovery. The babies born were 30 males and 20 females. No less than 314 patients received surgical treatment, apart from the obstetrical cases. Paying patients number 278; part pay 78; no pay 17. The country furnished 371 patients, 98 and 2 were from other provinces. Of the total 165 were Catholics 128 Presbyterians; 79 Methodists; forty four Anglicans; 38 Baptists, and 17 Christians. The X-Ray was used on 89 patients. Patients suffering from hypertrophied tonsils and adenoids ran the majority of cases pretty close, there being 45. The next highest classification was hernia 16. Trustees for the next three years were elected as follows: Messrs H. T. Holman, H. J. Massey, J. A. Brace, A. S. McKay, and Thomas D. Carruthers. All were re-elected with the exception of the last named, who was elected in place of Mr. John E. Campbell, retired. At the general meeting Mr. J. H. Prichard was appointed auditor. At a subsequent meeting of the Trustees, Mr. H. T. Holman was chosen President, Mr. Charles Hensley, Vice President, and Mr. H. J. Massey, Secretary.

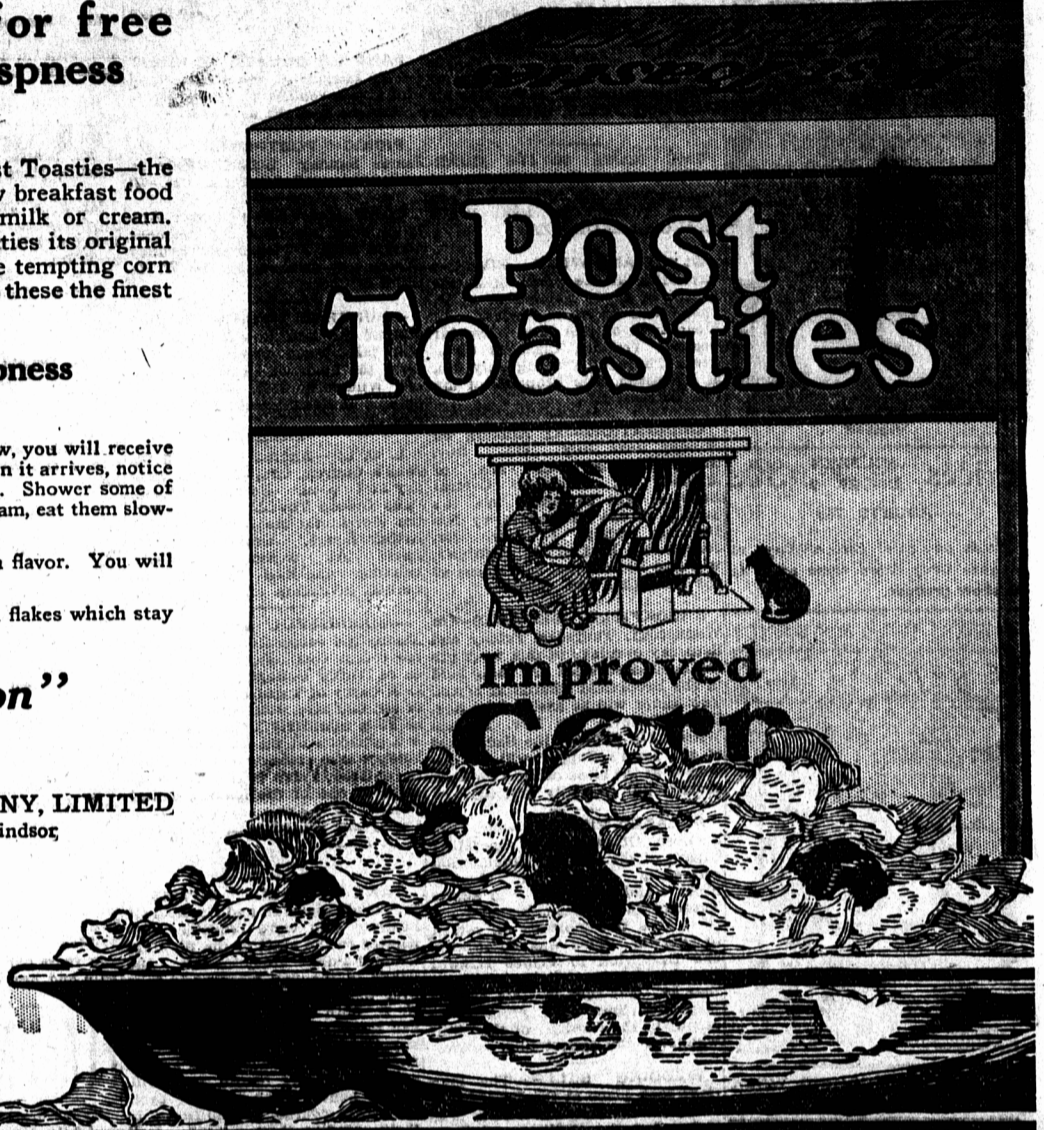

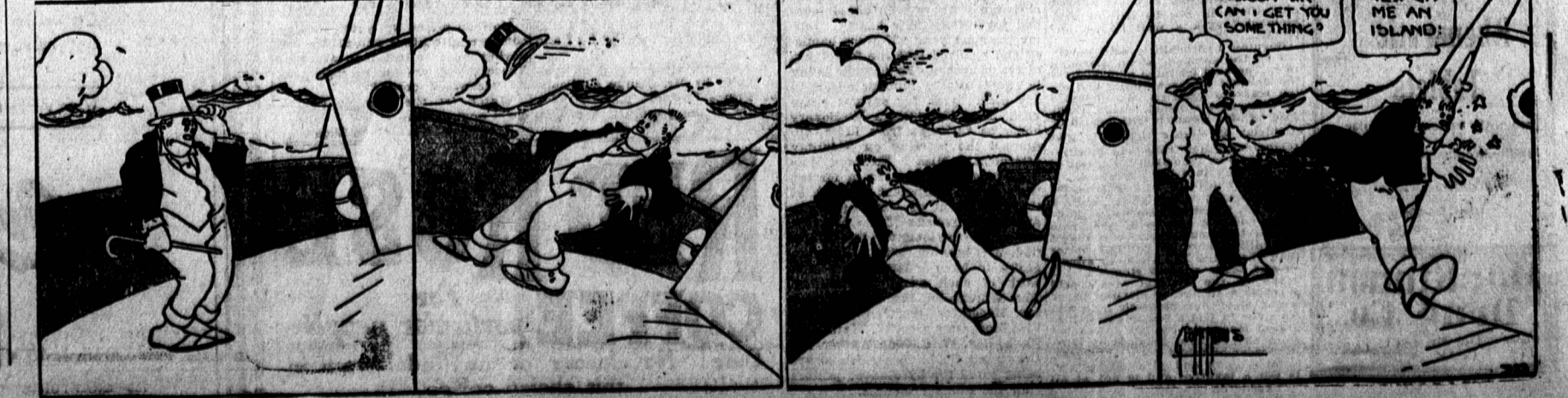
