That Lambert Todd raced over the ice and through the Quebec circuit in the latter part of the season as a hot keeper of Sherbrooke, Que., and after a very successful campaign in which he was driven by Fred Utton, went into the stable of Norm W. Stan Abey and a number of two and three-year-olds.

The dark-haired Canadian, credited with craftiness and durability, went down before the hard punching of one of the best welterweights in the business. Referee Frank Fullam stopped the scheduled 12-round bout after one-minute, 43 seconds of the second round when Berger had been knocked down twice and obviously had been badly hurt.
