The firemen were called out for a second time yesterday shortly after 9 p. m. There was nothing more serious to emerge than a fire in the chimney of the house occupied by A. Smith, corner of Hillsborough and Richmond Street.

THE train yesterday interfered somewhat with the running of the trains. The train from Charlottetown west got as far as Summerside, but no train came in from Summerside, and west of that point nothing was done with the exception of the train from Tignish coming this way a distance of a mile or so. On the Murray Harbor branch the train from Charlottetown got as far as Albion where it became stalled. The trains to Souris and to Georgetown came and went as usual, but were somewhat delayed. The drifts in some places on the track are said to have been very deep and the high wind kept the loose snow actively moving all day.

A VIOLENT March storm, with the wind blowing with great velocity from the north east, yesterday prevented the mail boats at the Capes making crossings either way, and also kept the S. S. Minto in durance vile where she has been since Tuesday. Consequently all communication with the mainland is cut off and mails for this Province are accumulating at Cape Tormentine waiting to be brought across, a task which all the available boats will hardly accomplish for several days. Freight also is gathering at Georgetown waiting to be carried to Pictou. The repairs to the Stanley are not yet completed and she will probably not leave Georgetown till next week.

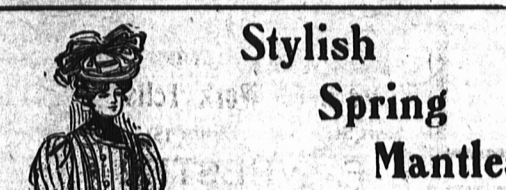
