Synopsis of Canadian Northwets Land Regulations

THIS sole right of a family or any male over sixteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, (Provision must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency on certain conditions.)

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within one mile of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres, on certain conditions. A homestead house is required, except where residence is performed in the field.

In certain districts a homesteader, in good standing may acquire a quarter section also as his homestead. Price \$20 per acre.

Duties Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also to accept extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$10 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 30 acres and erect house worth \$500.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony and, if stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

KILLED IN ACTION

ACTING CORPORAL HAROLD MCPHEE

Earnscliff has been saddened once more by the news that another of her brave sons has made the supreme sacrifice. A telegram received by Mrs Alex D. McPhee stating that her son Acting Corporal Harold L. McPhee had been killed in action, in France Sept. 24th 1918. He was the son of the late Alex D. and Mrs McPhee he was just 23 years and 5 months at the time of his death. He enlisted in the 195th Battalion, Nov. 22, 1915 crossed over to France in February 1918, having been transferred to the 26th Battalion, there he served faithfully and well, being promoted on the field for bravery, and clear judgment receiving two stripes.

We are having a pretty good time after some very hard fighting, no doubt you have heard by this time what the Canadians have done, and looks very much now as if we were going to win the war in the long run. We have taken all the ground back that they took four months to take we took it all in one month and now stand on ground that the British have not fought on yet. We will probably get to Germany before this coming summer. I have not heard from Will for some time because I have not had time to write to anybody, perhaps he is thinking I am wounded again but not this time and am getting on fine. Perhaps you will wonder why I am not writing more often but I really have not got time. How is everything around there now. Oh George McKenzie got killed in the last battle and Edison Mallett has joined the Battalion today. I had a talk with him I met him in town and I was surprised to see him for I thought he was in Canada by this time. Of that picture that I sent you there is only about ten of us left now of course they are not all killed but there a lot of them wounded. We have men that were conscripted and I am in charge of a section of them and I sure have some time.

As this is all the news I have to tell you this time I will have to close. So Good Bye for now. From your loving son Ted
