Opposition To Push Is Slight

Coroner's Jury Hears Evidence Of Tragic Death Of William Ryan

A coroner's jury last night brought in a verdict that William Ryan, 14 last as a result of a hemorrhage caused by a knife wound which according to evidence submitted was the result of a knife having been thrown by his wife, Florence Elizabeth McNeill.

Mrs. McNeill appeared yesterday morning before Stipendiary Magistrate K. M. Martin, charged with murder, and was remanded for a week.

The inquest, held at the City Police Court, was presided over by Coroner Dr. R. G. R. Holmes represented the Crown and Mr. R. R. Bell, Mrs. McNeill.

Brother's Testimony

Stanley Ryan, the first witness, stated his proper name was McNeill, that he was an older brother of the deceased, and that he last saw William alive and in good health Tuesday evening at 7.30 at the corner of King and Pownall. He saw the deceased again that evening at 8.30. Witness continued:

"Bill called me by name. He was off his own doorstep. Said he was stabbed and bleeding to death. I put my arm around his shoulder and walked about 30 yards with him. He said 'I can't make it' about ten feet from the corner of King and Union. Three boys helped us and we dragged him to the City Hospital, put him in bed, and unstripped him. Blood was coming down his back. Some was coming from his nose and mouth. When I returned to my home at 11.15, he said his wife had stabbed him."

Performed Autopsy

Dr. J. D. McGuligan said he had performed, with Dr. E. S. Giddings, a post-mortem on William McNeill Tuesday afternoon at 2.30. Deceased was 5 feet, ten inches tall, weight about 170 pounds. Eleven wounds were found.

War Situation Last Night

Hooked on the horns of a two-pronged Allied offensive in France and Holland, the Nazi high command in the west appears to have signalled a manpower-conserving retreat in the Moselle and Maas (Meuse) bulges.

That, at least, is the construction placed on field reports of relative light German resistance to both the American 3rd army efforts to iron out the Metz-Thionville westward hump in the south and the British drive in the north to clear the west bank of the Meuse.

The broad intimation of the indicated German withdrawal from the bulges is that the Nazi command still expects the main Allied winter push to come again on the Neder Rhine sector in Holland against the Arnhem-Emmerich gateway to the north German plains. In other words, a flanking rather than a frontal assault operation.

Security of that critical segment of the German defence front in the west is obviously the Nazis' first consideration. It is an extemporized position on Netherlands soil at best, lacking the months or years of preparation that went into the construction of the Siegfried Line. British airborne forces all but succeeded in seizing and consolidating a Neder Rhine crossing at Arnhem. By every indication, Nazi field troops have now been massed at that end of the battle line to safeguard it from a new Allied assault.

In the eyes of Allied staff spokesmen and front line press observers that explains Nazi failure to cling desperately to the Moselle and Meuse bulges. Mobile troops to deal with the American encroachment drive on Metz and Thionville or the British thrust into the Meuse bulge west of Venlo cannot be spared from the more vital task of guarding the lower Rhine gateway. An Allied breakthrough there would virtually nullify the whole of the Siegfried "westwall" lying west of the Rhine.

The obvious recourse for the Germans would be to pull out of the twin bulges in France and Holland, important as they must be as outposts for the defence of the German frontier itself. There are certainly still must be cracked. The Meuse itself probably will prove a serious barrier to the British after the west bank has been cleared.

Brings To 69 Number Sunk In Five Days

LONDON, Nov. 15 — (CP Reuter) — British submarines operating against the Japanese in the Far Eastern waters have sunk another 23 supply ships and an anti-aircraft vessel, the Admiralty announced tonight.

Last week it was announced that Royal Navy submarines operating in that area sank 45 Japanese ships, and the new bag brought to 69, the number accounted for in five days.

The supply ships were engaged on coastal traffic and, in order to carry out successful operations, the communiqué said, the submarines had in many cases to approach close to Japanese occupied territory and within range of Japanese shore batteries.

All the Japanese vessels were heavily laden and many were carrying fuel and blew up, the communiqué said.

The anti-submarine vessel was intercepted in the East Java Sea, south of Celebes, and sunk by a torpedo.

During these patrols, British submarines damaged three small supply vessels by gunfire. Two of these ships were left in such an unseaworthy condition that their crews had to run them aground.

In addition, a bombardment was carried out against the harbor on the island of Caracobar in the Indian Ocean. Buildings and installations were damaged and several small craft lying alongside the jetty were sunk.

Since the beginning of the year it was said British warships have sunk 158 Japanese vessels including one Japanese cruiser, the Tama, and a large supply ship to anti-submarine boats.

It was believed that a 7,000 ton aircraft carrier sank after being torpedoed and at least one other cruiser was destroyed by a torpedo.

Bombardment of shore installations and ports as the submarines run close to port at the supply ships, the communiqué said. The submarines also have surfaced often to shell enemy ships.

SUPREME ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, PARIS, Nov. 15 — (AP) — British 2nd Army troops today drove five miles through the boglands of Eastern Holland to within 37 miles of the key German industrial centre of Duisburg on the Rhine, while American infantry bypassed bloody Fort Driant and surged in close to the suburbs of Metz from three sides, clamping the fortress city in a death grip.

Bitter weather and thick minefields supplied most of the opposition as the British 2nd Army formations, supported by flame-throwers, fought through the second day of their new offensive southeast of Eindhoven in Holland. A staff officer reported: "We are pushing on fast and for the present, at least, there is nothing much in sight to stop us."

The questions are: "Are you in favour of immediate making available for overseas reinforcements the drafts called up for Home Defence?" And "Will you pledge yourself to support this policy and to demand a recorded vote in parliament?"

The letter, referring to the opening of a special session of parliament next Wednesday, Nov. 22, asked that the answers to the questions be made public by the end of this week.

Lancasters Bomb Nazi Synthetic Oil Plant

LONDON, Nov. 15 — (CP-Reuters) — R. A. F. Lancasters, escorted by Mustangs this afternoon attacked the synthetic oil plant at Dortmund in the Ruhr, the Air Ministry announced.

It was the first operation by heavy bombers from Britain since the attack on the German battleship Tirpitz last Sunday morning.

Believes King's Cabinet Will Stick With Him

OTTAWA, Nov. 15 — (CP) — Prime Minister Mackenzie King will remain in the House of Commons next Wednesday with a cabinet united to the extent of giving De- lais-Blanc, Minister of National Defence, an opportunity to show how he can provide adequate reinforcements for the forces overseas by the voluntary system. It was learned tonight.

Mr. King has no reservations or qualms about the stand taken by the House of Commons, the Minister, to send draftees overseas under conditions to be decided by the House at a secret session. Mr. King said he would support these Ministers will remain at their posts and give him every support.

Two Women Murdered In Los Angeles

Detective Lieut. Harry Hansen said Wilson had been identified by fingerprints as the slayer of 25-year-old Virgie Lee Griffin and Lillian Johnson. The bodies of both women had been mutilated.

Hansen also said Fred O'Brian, hotel bellhop, had identified Wilson as the man who registered with Miss Johnson as man and wife.

Authorities said Wilson had been arrested before on charges of attempted rape. He was taken into custody late today within a few hours of the slaying.

8th Army Makes Good Progress

ROME, Nov. 15 — (AP) — The British 8th Army, advancing from small bridgeheads established across the Montone River west of Forlì, has driven forward to a general line two miles north of a loop of the river and has made good progress elsewhere along the eastern sector of the Italian front, the Allied command announced today.

After crossing the Montone, 8th Army units seized a foothold on broad highway Nine, leading to Bologna, at a point two miles northwest of Forlì, capturing Monte Poggio and the village of Villagrappa south of the road.

Resistance generally seemed to slacken in the hills below highway Nine. Allied forces were in contact with the Germans about 1,000 yards northwest of San Varano, which is on the southern outskirts of Forlì. An advance of 2,000 yards was made in this area. An enemy rearguard liquidated and 20 prisoners were captured.

Winter Weather

To the south of this big push, the American 7th Army labored deeper into the snow-dusted Vosges foothills, with enemy resistance stiffest in the northern sector east of the Forest de Farray and slackening off further south.

Field dispatches said eight inches of frost snow blanketed the Vosges foothills tonight. The entire western front was wrapped in real winter weather, and no planes left British bases today.

Seek To Discourage Matches In Parcels

OTTAWA, Nov. 15 — (CP) — As part of the campaign to discourage the sending of parcels to the front, the Government is urging that parcels to the front be sent in parcels.

The statement said that "It was to be expected that any form of production which expanded so greatly in the past few years would shrink severely during the period of transition from war to peace time conditions."

Mr. Howe said he was not expressing any personal opinion on the issue but on the basis of the full information he did not believe it is a question of means and means, but a question of meeting an overwhelming need. He spoke, he said, for the purpose of giving former Canadians now living in Chicago some of the background on the situation.

The speech was made as one of the first utterances by a Minister, other than Prime Minister Mackenzie King, Defence Minister De lais-Blanc and former Defence Minister Halston since Col. Halston's resignation from the cabinet in Canada, said Mr. Howe had as high a proportion of its population enlisted in the forces as practically any Allied country with the exception of the United Kingdom.

Of the 2,000,000 men called up for the army all but about 60,000 had volunteered for service anywhere.

"Conscription is not a political issue in Canada and an issue that will likely become greater as time goes on."

De Gaulle To Visit Moscow

PARIS, Nov. 15 — (AP) — Gen. De Gaulle will leave shortly for Moscow on invitation of Premier Stalin, and French officials speculated tonight that President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill would also be invited to visit Moscow.

De Gaulle and Foreign Minister Georges Bidault would leave on an unspecified but imminent date.

Hint Nazis To Abandon Metz

LONDON, Nov. 15 — (CP Reuter) — Capt. Ludwig Serlornius, German military commentator, dropping what was considered a broad hint that the Germans might be preparing to abandon Metz, said tonight "we do not regard Metz as a sufficient valuable position to wage a battle to the death for it."

"It is worth, however, a restricted number of forces to delay the enemy," he added.

1st French Army Launches Attack
