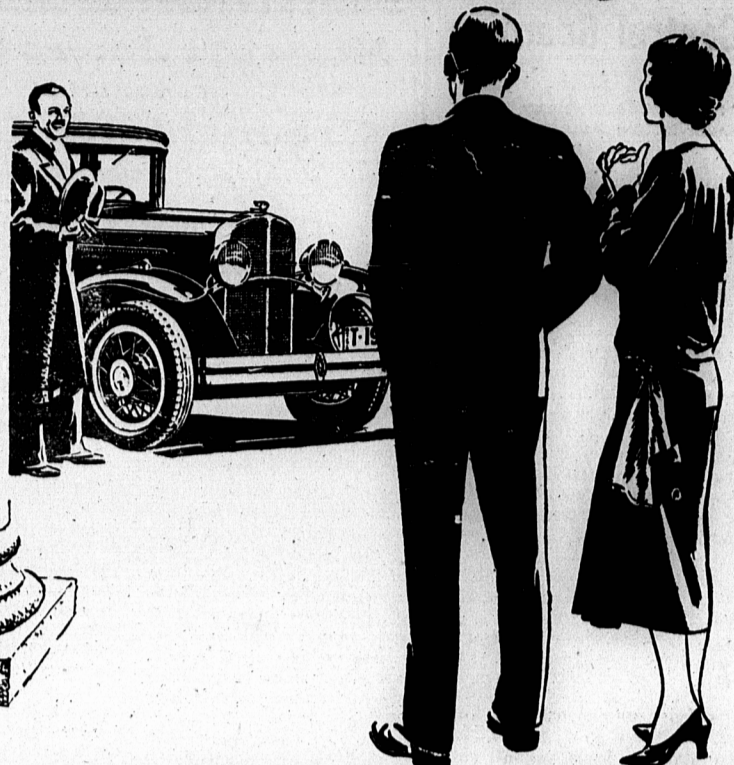

TORONTO, March 2—Probably setting a precedent in the history of British legal practice, Mrs Sala Goldberg, widow of the murdered Samuel Goldberg, issued a writ at Osgoode Hall today claiming \$50,000 damages from Abraham Steinberg, convicted of the murder and sentenced to hang on April 21 next by Mr Justice Jeffrey.

The writ was issued from the office of Nesbitt McMurtry, and Ganong about 1 o'clock today on behalf of Mrs Goldberg and her two children and claims "as widow of Samuel Goldberg, deceased, damages for wrongfully, wilfully and unlawfully causing the death of the said Samuel Goldberg on the fifth day of March, 1930."

Asked by The Star whether such an action had ever been taken before Roy McMurtry, counsel for Mrs Goldberg, stated that, after careful consideration, he was of the opinion that this was the first action against a convicted murderer in the history of Canadian or English courts.

The right to take this action, he said, was given under the Fatal Accidents Act. The claim, he added, was for \$50,000.

"Will the hearing of the action take place before the execution?" The Star asked. "I think it would have to," said Mr. Murtry. "We intend to press for a speedy trial."

An appeal has previously been entered by Steinberg against his conviction.

Steinberg was the uncle of Goldberg and the two had been partners in a monument business. In the first trial for murder the jury disagreed.

Twelve British Head-Mistresses Coming To Can.

SAINT JOHN, N.B., March 2—The party of 12 British head-mistresses who will visit Canada this spring will travel from England on the same steamer as the Governor-General the Earl of Bessborough and the Countess, the C.P.S. Duches of Bedford due to leave the old country on March 27, and to reach Saint John on the Easter week end. Miss Edith Thompson, C.B.E. who is planning the headmistresses tour, arrived here today on the C.P.S. Mellia and left at noon for Halifax, intending to visit the various centres in Canada to make arrangements for the coming of the main party.

ECONOMY OF VEGETABLE GARDENS

War time gardening taught the people of the country how much could be saved by growing their own vegetable supplies and by utilizing any uncultivated ground in the community for gardening purposes. An era of hard times has brought these lessons back vividly and a revival of vegetable gardening.

In country districts, a vegetable garden is a matter of course. Everybody with a yard has one and grows something in the way of food. In the smaller city and suburban home lots, vegetable gardens which flourished formerly have been giving way to ornamental planting as market gardening progressed and always provided a supply of vegetables in the markets.

LIVESTOCK MARKETS

(Canada Press) MONTREAL Que., March 2—Cattle receipts were 648 on the Montreal livestock markets today. There was a comparatively light offering of cattle and a fair percentage of good butcher cattle in the offering, but at that, traders were more or less deadlocked. Prices offered were around \$6.50 to \$6.75 for good butcher steers, and \$4 for fairly good cows and were estimated to be about 50c below last week's.

QUOTATIONS—Odd choice picked out brought up to \$5 and \$5.25. One load of 1,000 pounds cattle of fairly good average quality brought \$6.25, on sows.

\$9.25; medium \$8.50 to \$9; common including four or five good heifers; and one load of light steers and heifers sold for \$5.25.

CALF RECEIPTS 876. Calves were in fairly good demand. The bulk of the veal calves were sold for \$8.25 to \$9 with an odd sale on common light veals at \$8. Common drinkers brought as low as \$6 and a few good veals were picked out at \$9 and \$9.25

QUOTATIONS—Good veal \$9 to \$6 to \$8.

SHEEP RECEIPTS 202. Good ewe lambs made \$9 and mixed lots were sold at \$7 to \$7.50. Sheep ranged from \$3 to \$5.50.

QUOTATIONS—Ewes \$3 to \$5.50; lambs good \$9; common \$7 to \$7.50.

HOG RECEIPTS 2,764. Hogs were unsettled. Trade was slow and prices were estimated to be 50c to \$1 lower than last week's quotations. Early sales took between 600 and 800 hogs at \$6.75 to \$7 for bacon and butchers fed and watered. Feeders brought around \$8. Prices were not established
