BAKED SPECIAL

Two or three cups of cooked spinach. 1 cup bread crumbs, 1 1/2 cups white sauce, 2 or 3 eggs, beaten; salt and pepper to taste.
Mix together and bake in buttered dish one hour.
White Sauce: One and a half cups milk, 3 tablespoons butter, 3 tablespoons flour, salt and pepper to taste. Cook until thick, add to spinach. Add to spinach mixture above.

Silly Wife Who Insists on Traveling With Her Salesman Husband—Must the Family Support an Unwelcome Sister-in-Law?—Widow's Rights

Dear Miss Dix—I have been married for six years and have a sweet little wife and two small girls. We have lived a very happy and peaceful life until recently when the firm for which I am a traveling salesman started sending me on out-of-town trips. On some of these I am gone a week or ten days. This was all right with my wife until her mother began telling her that she should accompany me on these business trips. This is impossible, due to the fact that my expenses are paid and my boss would not consent to my having any one go with me. This is causing much trouble between my wife and myself. She is beginning to lose her faith in me, and for the children's sake I am asking you for help. What would you do?

Answer:
My earnest advice to you is to stick to your job and not let a silly wife and a meddling mother-in-law ruin your chance of promotion with your firm, or cause you to give up a situation in these times of unemployment. For, believe me, Percy, you would find it hard enough to get a place with any other firm if it was known that you are ruled by an unreasonable woman and had to do what they said instead of what you know to be the right and wise thing to do. Nothing could make a man seem weaker or less desirable to an employer than for him to be tied to his wife's apron strings.

If your wife has any intelligence at all, why not appeal to it? Why not make her understand that her bread and butter and the children's depend upon your giving satisfaction to your firm, and that every employe is under discipline and must either do what he is told to do or else get out and make room for some one who is willing to fall in with the routine of the firm? Furthermore, tell her that employes are expected to do their work willingly and not grudgingly, and that their wives' opinion on the subject is not even considered.

Try to make her see that if you had her along with you on a trip you could not make the quick jumps from place to place that you can make alone, and that you would have to spend a lot of your time taking care of her and seeing that she was comfortable. And figure out for her the cost of her transportation and her hotel bills, and unless she is beyond all reason she will comprehend why it is not feasible for you to take her along with you on your trips. Perhaps the fact that it would take everything that you make to pay her way would appeal to her.

Moreover, perhaps you can make her realize that she would be very uncomfortable and bored to death after the first trip, hanging around little hotels alone, with nothing to do and nobody to talk to while you are out seeing your customers. Also she would be homesick for the children whom she would be sadly neglecting, while she was traipsing around trying to keep an eye on you.

As for her fear that you will be unfaithful to her if you leave home without her, that is ridiculous. Faith is a matter of honor, of loyalty, of love, not the result of espionage. No woman can watch her husband every minute of the day and night. The spy system always breaks down somewhere and she has to trust him in the end.

After you have tried to talk your wife into sanity, have a heart-to-heart talk with your mother-in-law and ask her why she is trying to break up your home and alienate your wife from you. Ask her if she thinks her daughter will be happier if she divorced from you and the children are half-orphaned.

It seems to me that the cruellest and most malicious thing that any women ever does is when she tries to plant suspicion of her husband in her daughter's mind. If a mother should kill a daughter, it would be a lesser crime than it is for her to kill her daughter's faith in her husband, for a woman's whole happiness in marriage depends upon her trust in him and in her belief that he loves her and is doing the best he can for her.

Yet so many mothers sow the seeds of jealousy and discontent in their daughters' hearts. I have known mothers who would tell their daughters that they had better watch some good-looking employe of their husbands; mothers who would ask their daughters if they supposed that their husbands really were at work, as they said they were, when they stayed downtown at night; mothers who first put it in their daughters' minds that they were being neglected, or that their husbands were stingy and didn't give them enough fine clothes or that they were poor, persecuted martyrs because they had to keep house and raise families.

Why mothers try to dissatisfy their daughters with the bargains they have made in matrimony, nobody knows. Perhaps jealousy is at the root of it, but the results are that they shatter their daughters' happiness and wreck their homes and bring them to misery and divorce. A fiend could do no worse.

But certainly, Percy, you have my sympathy. A man who has to deal with a malicious mother-in-law and a weak, easily influenced wife has his troubles cut out for him.
