THREW INK WELL AT PREMIER

MELBOURNE, July 23.—As the outcome of a stormy interview between H. S. W. Lawson, Premier of Victoria, and a deputation of soldiers in the Premier's office today, the Premier was struck on the head and cut by an ink well thrown by one of the soldiers. The men then proceeded to pitch the office furniture into the streets and tore up important official documents. The police dispersed the rioters and arrested five of them. Later a crowd attempted to rush the watch house nearby and stoned the police, but was dispersed with several casualties.

The difficulty had its origin yesterday, when a crowd including returned soldiers and sailors attempted to rush a military barracks. Shots were fired and a passing soldier was killed. There were several arrests made and afterwards excited meetings of soldiers were held at which the police methods were denounced.

Today representatives of the soldiers went to Premier Lawson's office and demanded the release of the men arrested. The Premier promised to make an inquiry into the affair, but this did not satisfy the men, and the ink well throwing and other disorders followed.

VASE 2,249 YEARS OLD

An interesting new feature of the Greek and Roman galleries at the British Museum is the famous Orestes vase from the Hope collection.

"This magnificent art treasure in terra cotta has had some remarkable modern vicissitudes," said Arthur Smith, the keeper of these treasures. "The vase, which is dated 330 B. C., was saved, during the French Revolution, from the fury of the mob by being walled up in a secret room. Afterwards it fell into the hands of Adrian Hope, the rich banker.

"When the Hope collection was sold the vase was purchased by an American collector to take across the Atlantic. Because of the submarine menace, however, the American got 'panicky,' and decided to sell the treasure again rather than risk its getting sent to the bottom of the sea.

"With the assistance of the National Art Fund and the help of other donors a sufficiently large sum was raised to purchase it for the nation; but because London was bombed so badly, the vase was placed 80 feet below ground in the Post Office tube for safety. This is the first time it will have been on view as national property."

AN AUTHOR'S LUCK
A curious illustration of the "luck" with which some books meet is shown in the history of Henry Seton Merriman's novel, "The Grey Lady." The first edition was brought out among the holiday issues of 1895, and although favorably received by the reviewers and described as "intensely dramatic," "with fresh, vigorous plot," etc. Very little attention in general seems to have been paid it, and for eighteen months the first edition was sufficient to meet all demands. Some time later, however, a second edition was published, appearing with a specially designed cover in gray and gold. Far from repeating the experience of the first edition, the second was sold out almost immediately and orders were received for fully half of the third edition. It is but another curious instance of that fickleness of the literary taste of the public.

GREATEST JACKPLANE

A machine so gigantic that the curvature of the earth's surface had to be taken into consideration in its construction, is being built for the United States Army as part of the program for the "salvage" of war waste, says World's Work. It is a huge planer 500 feet long, which is to be used in the manufacture of gigantic lathes, which in turn are for use in the enormous "refining" plant which the ordnance department is building in France.
