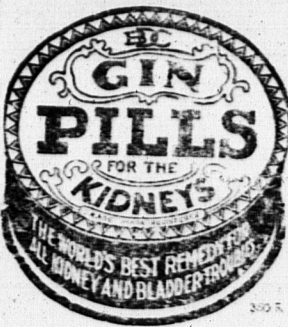
Greater attention should be given to our Public Squares with provision of more seating accommodation for the public. A clean-up of obnoxious refuse dumps in various sections of the city is favored.

Weekly Market Letter

The receipts of live stock on the two markets the week ending Jan. 28th amounted to 2,900 cattle, 472 calves, 457 sheep and lambs and 2,550 hogs. In addition to the above there were 130 cattle on through billing for export.

The cattle market suffered this week from the all too common habit which prevails on all yards of loading heavily on every bulge in the market. After a strong market last week when cattle advanced an increase of 15 per cent in this week's receipts which was enough to cause the market to lose the most of last week's advance.

The cattle market opened slow and straggly and prices on all kinds of butcher cattle suffered a decline of around 50 cents per hundred pounds from last week's level. The top of the market was \$7.50 per hundred for a load of good steers and a pair of good heifers.

There were good enough to bring over \$6.50. Now, heavy butcher cattle weighing from 500 to 950 brought from \$4.00 to \$5.50. Good cowboys generally from \$3.00 to \$4.00. Cows of medium quality and good weight brought from \$3.00 to \$4.75, common cows from \$2.00 to \$3.75 and canners and cutters from \$2.00 to \$3.00. There was quite a liberal offering of bulls which were mostly from Toronto Market. An old handy weight bull brought \$6.00, a little better but the bulk of the best bulls brought from \$5.00 to \$5.50, with common heavy bulls selling around \$3.75.

Calf receipts were light and the market was strong for anything of the kind. The best of the calves did not give any market strength to the market. Lambs sold generally from \$9.00 to \$9.50 with a few up to \$10.00. Sheep were steady at from \$4.00 to \$5.00.

An indication of the trend of the trade may be taken from the fact that the market for fat hogs was around 200 pounds or a little better were offered at \$12.00 while hogs were paying as high as \$13.00 the same day for the bacon type of hog.

At the close of the week a few cattle and hogs were left unsold at one of the markets, but for the dressed meat trade has been fairly active during the week and packers' stocks are reported to be low. The sixth of the hog market in Toronto this week should be reflected in Montreal by a strong market next week.

The hog market was somewhat uneven throughout the week while some hogs were sold for \$12.50, others realized \$12.75, or a little better. At the close of the week a few hogs remained in the pens as sellers are looking forward to better prices next week.

Stags sold from \$8.50 to \$9.75.

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
