THE TARIFF QUESTION.

As has frequently been pointed out in these columns there is an active agitation in the United States and permeating both political parties in favor of tariff reduction and reciprocity. The late President McKinley saw the necessity before he was removed, and a number of leading Republicans and newspapers of that party are strenuously advocating a reduction of tariff rates. Meanwhile the Democratic party may be said to be committed to tariff reform and reduction as the main plank in their platform for the next presidential election.

Here in Canada the active agitation tends in the opposite direction. The manufacturers claim that they need further protection against the great industrial combine across the border, while a portion of those in Canada formerly strongly committed to a tariff for revenue only are beginning to look with some favor upon a system of retaliatory duties toward the United States. John Charlton, M. P. is one of the number. In support of this contention it is pointed out that in tariff matters we have been met with a spirit of selfishness and greed by our neighbors across the border, who have fenced out Canadian products from their country as far as possible, while they are now able to supply Canada with more than half of all the manufactured goods which she imports from abroad. This is true notwithstanding the preference of one third off which we give to the United Kingdom.

The selfish unfairness of the treatment accorded to Canada in commercial matters, is indeed admitted by the more fair-minded of their own leading journals. The Boston Herald among the number says: "We are treating the Canadians in trade matters in a reprehensibly unfair manner; we have alienated to quite a degree their good feeling towards us by this unwise action; we have thrown them into the current of British imperialism simply because we have not had the wit to wisely develop and apply a great trade policy which should embrace the entire continent. And now under the instigation of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, which, it is said, is to carry on a vigorous campaign in all parts of Canada in favor of greater protection, it is by no means impossible that a sentiment in favor of retaliation against us can be built up which will compel Sir Wilfrid Laurier's government to place, through stringent custom exactions, a practical interdiction upon the coming into the Dominion of a very large part of the American wares that now find a market on the other side of our northern frontier."

American unfairness is the lever by which the manufacturers hope to move the people and Government of Canada to a policy of higher duties. But our people and Government will do well to consider three main facts of the situation before taking action to raise the rates of duty. The first fact is that our manufacturing industries are so prosperous as not to need increased protection. Another fact is that there is a strong and widespread movement in the United States in favor of tariff reduction. This when effect-

ed will have practically the same general result upon Canadian trade with the United States as would an increase in our own tariff. A third fact is that by close competition from outside our people get the benefit of cheaper goods than they could otherwise obtain. There is a very great advantage to consumers in this, while at the same time our own manufacturers are stimulated to use the latest and best appliances of production, and to furnish products of superior excellence. Close competition is always a healthful stimulus in both manufacture and trade. And if with the present rate of duties our manufacturers cannot hold their own in the home market it is safe to say there must be something wrong with their methods.

Up in Manitoba they are boasting of wheat ears 7½ inches long. The latest accounts fully confirm the earlier reports of an unprecedented yield. The crop is moreover approaching the time when it will be out of reach of its greatest danger the summer frosts. Harvesting will be pretty general during the coming week, we are told. Once ripened and cut and the frost will be powerless to injure the grain, but the harvesting process will necessarily cover three weeks before its completion, and wheat while standing is always liable to more or less damage should frost come upon it. It is therefore probable that at least some of the later wheat will suffer. The coming two weeks will be a time of anxiety to our prairie brethren in regard to both frost and rain.

Heretofore widows of natives in India were prohibited from marrying, as years ago they were compelled to be burned on the funeral pile with their husbands' bodies. Under British rule the practice of suttee, or burning, was long since declared illegal, and it is now rare that a widow violates the law. In 1829 in Bengal alone, 575 widows gave themselves up to be burned. Of these 109 were above sixty, 226 above forty, 250 above twenty and 32 under 20 years of age. They were induced to prefer burning because of the disgrace attributed to sorrowing widowhood, and the impossibility of marrying again. Slowly the native population have become reconciled to the abolition of suttee. Quite recently one of the native rulers took the unheard of step of issuing a decree permitting the remarriage of widows. Thus steadily if slowly the better influences of Christianity and civilization are making headway in India.

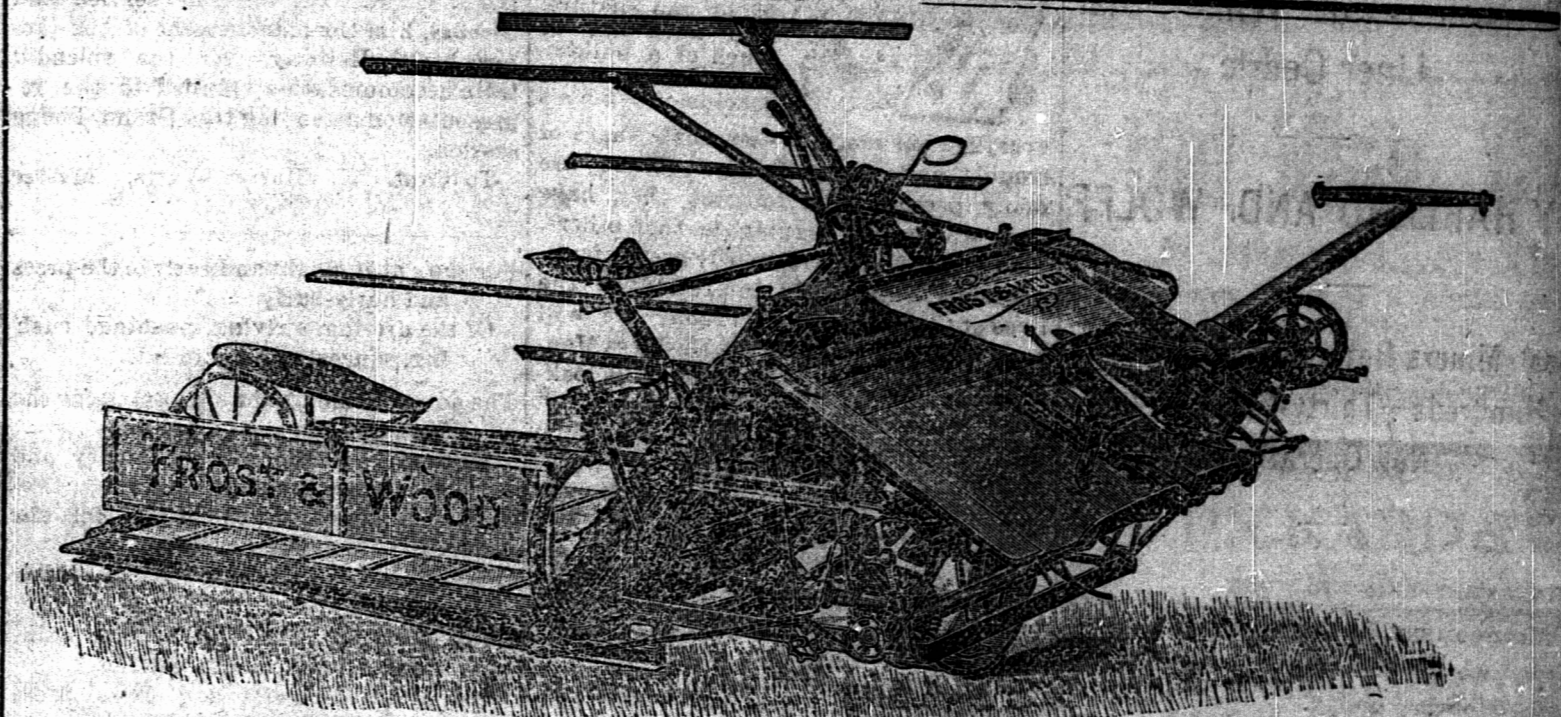
