RUSSIA'S CASE FULLY STATED

In Regard to Seizing Steamers in Red Sea.

The Russ, a Government Organ Defends the Status of Russian Volunteer Fleet.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 20.—The Russ to day publishes an editorial statement of Russia's position relative to the stopping of neutral ships in the Red Sea by vessels of the volunteer fleet. There is great interest in the statement, because it is believed to reflect directly the views of the Foreign Office. It reads as follows:—

STATUS OF SHIPS

"The operations of the converted cruisers 'Smolensk' and 'St. Petersburg' are causing tremendous excitement in England. Questions are being asked in parliament, the newspapers are appealing to the public, and there is a panic among ship owners. There also is a good deal of talk in Germany because of the seizure of mails on the steamer 'Prinz Heinrich' but the most noise there is being made by extremist organs, the others treating the matter coolly. It is a pity the English do not display the same Teutonic calmness."

"It is easy to understand that the British merchant marine feels these restrictions a verily. As a result of the stopping and searching of vessels, English ships of her must give up transporting contraband on their own risk and peril in time of war between two powers. Others are bound to suffer more or less, as it is impossible to check contraband traffic without search."

In regard to the detention of the 'Prinz Heinrich's' mails, details have not yet reached St. Petersburg. Comprehensive discussion of this incident is, therefore, impossible; but, it must be pointed out, the official correspondence of a belligerent is contraband. Consequently, if the 'Prinz Heinrich' carried Japanese diplomatic and consular reports she was liable to seizure. Of course, whether she did or not, the correspondence can be inspected to determine this fact.

ABOUT THE BOSPHORUS PASSAGE.

"The English raised the question as to whether we were justified in converting the volunteer fleet steamers into warships after they had passed the Dardanelles under the commercial flag. This is strange. Every government has a right either to build warships in its own yards, or order them abroad, buy them already built, and finally to convert them into warships. The war volunteer fleet at its very inception, was intended to be converted into a military fleet upon the declaration of war."

"The English should not feel incensed over the passage of the 'St. Petersburg' and 'Smolensk' through the Dardanelles. The British embassy at Constantinople hands in a protest to the Turkish Government every time a volunteer fleet passes their straits. For many years these protests have been entirely disregarded, and, therefore, long ago lost their importance. Before the war, the Dardanelles were repeatedly passed by volunteer ships on the way to Far West, even with troops, arms and ammunition aboard. If this was possible before the war, it is possible now, as there has been no change in our relations with Turkey as a result of the war with Japan. When the 'St. Petersburg' and 'Smolensk' passed through the straits

Despite the insistency of the French, German and Russian newspapers on the alleged brutality of the Japanese and his indifference to suffering, both on his own part and for others, this photograph, taken on the field by a correspondent, shows that as a matter of fact the yellow men can have kind hearts once the real business of the war has been settled for the time being. The accommodations for the Japanese wounded have been stated by experienced war correspondents to excel any ever put in the field. All reports show that the Russian wounded are given the best of medical attention when near any considerable Japanese encampment or military base. In fact a wounded Russian stands a better chance for his life if picked up by the Japanese Red Cross than if cared for by the less skillful surgeons of the Cossack armies.

under the merchant flag their destination was correctly given as being the Far East.

"In fact, the vessel upon entering the Red Sea, arms, hoisted the military flag. The fundamental principle of international law, that a neutral flag covers all goods, will not, of course, be violated by our cruisers. Consequently, the cargoes aboard the ships of neutral powers containing no contraband of war will remain as free as ever."

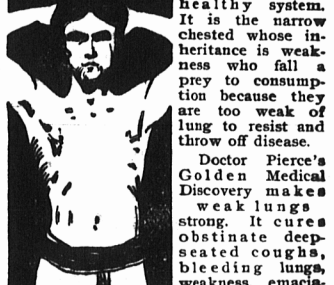
RUSSIA BUYS WARSHIPS.

LONDON, July 20.—The Daily Mail this morning prints a despatch from Buenos Ayres, dated July 19, saying that the armored cruisers Garibaldi and Pueyrredon, sister ships of the Nisshin and Kikugi, which were purchased by Japan prior to the war, have been sold to a French firm, but that the real purchaser is the Russian government.
