P. U. playing two men short due to penalties.

Two minutes later however Diamond gave the Superiors the lead again on Warren's pass inside the line and then Maher made victory certain as he broke away from a desperate L. P. U. gang attack to have Chipman at his mercy.

Norway Wins World Speed Skating Title

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) DAVOS, Switzerland, Feb. 2—By equalling the world's record for 1,500 metres despite a driving snowstorm, Ivar Ballangrud of Norway won the 1935 world speed skating championship today, scoring 194.9 points in the four events. Eddie Schroeder of Chicago, leading United States performer, finished third in the point scoring behind Birger Vasenius of Finland. Vasenius scored 196.6 points and Schroeder 198.4. The low point total is the best.

Michael Stakrud of Norway took fourth place with 199.5 points. Robert Peterson of Milwaukee fifth with 201.9 and Max Stiepl of Austria sixth with 202.3. Selen Kin of Japan, his country's only contestant, who took part in four events, placed with 204.4 points.

Ballangrud skated the 1,500 metres in two minutes, 17.4 seconds to equal the world mark set by O. Mathisen of Norway in 1914. Harry Haraldsen of Norway was second in 2:18.6 and Vasenius third in 2:20.5. Schroeder was fourth.

In the 10,000 metres, Ballangrud's time of 17:57.1 gave him third place. Vasenius turned in the best performance, 17:51.4 and Stiepl was second in 17:52.4. Schroeder's time was 18:16.2, giving him seventh place.

KIT KLEIN TRIUMPHS

STOCKHOLM, Feb. 2—Kit Klein, speedy Buffalo, N. Y., girl, won the world's speed skating championship for women today by finishing second in the 5,000 metre race after scoring two victories yesterday in the shorter events.

Miss Klein, who captured the 500 metre and 3,000 metre races yesterday, could place no better than third today in the 1,000 metres but that place, with her second in the distance event, gave her a winning point total.

In the deciding race the Buffalo girl trailed Verne Lesche of Finland, who broke her own world record by skating the distance in 10 minutes, 15.3 seconds. Her previous mark was 10:28.3.

Rangers And Maple Leafs Play Draw In Midget Game: Canadiens Defeat Beavers

Midget Rangers and Maple Leafs battled to a 2-all draw at the Forum Saturday afternoon in the first game of a doubleheader of the Midget Hockey League while in the second encounter the smooth-working Canadiens accounted for all their goals in the first period as they sent St. Avar Beavers down to a 3-0 defeat. Both games were a big improvement over former midget sessions with the players displaying better team-work and all-round hockey ability.

The score indicated the closeness of the Maple Leaf-Ranger game. Neither team could show any margin over the other although the Rangers were a much better squad than they were at the start of the league. Rangers And Maple Leafs Play Draw In Midget Game: Canadiens Defeat Beavers

CHICAGO, Feb. 2—Tyron Raymond Cobb, fiery genius of the diamond for 24 triumphant years, will be the number one immortal in baseball's permanent hall of fame.

The famous Georgian, who shattered virtually all records known to baseball during his glorious era, won the distinction as the immortal of immortals today by outscoring such diamond greats as Babe Ruth, Honus Wagner and Christy Mathewson in the nation-wide poll to determine which 10 players of the modern age should be represented in the game's memorial hall at Cooperstown, N. Y.

Only Cobb, Ruth, Wagner, Mathewson and Walter Johnson, probably the speed ball king of them all, received the required majority to win places in the hall of fame. But Cobb was given a margin of seven votes over his closest rivals, Ruth and Wagner. Out of 226 ballots cast by players and writers, the Georgia Peach received 222, or four less than a unanimous vote.

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Red Wings & Leafs Capture Saturday Tilts

The win shot Red Wings back into the American section lead for 24 hours at least over Chicago Black Hawks who lost the first of their double week-end bill at Toronto. Canadiens held third place in the Canadian section but lost ground to Americans who have played fewer games.

NEW YORK, Feb. 2—A scoring spurge in the second period gave New York Rangers a 4-2 victory over Montreal Maroons in a fast National Hockey League match before a capacity crowd of 15,000 here tonight.

The teams were even at one goal apiece at the end of the first frame which saw Frankie Boucher score for Rangers on Butch Keeling's assist and Herbie Cain equalize four minutes later on Gus Marner's pass. Cecil Dillon dashed from behind his own goal early in the second frame to score a spectacular marker and give Rangers the lead. Maroons were enjoying a one man advantage at the time Ching Johnson, bulky New York defenceman being hit by the penalty box. Six minutes later Bill Cook, veteran Ranger forward, scored his second goal of the season on Garden ice with the aid of Art Coulter. Three minutes later Howie Morenz, speedy wingman, gave Rangers a three goal edge by scoring on a pass from Lynn Patrick and Dillon.

Maroons got the only goal of the last 20 minutes when Dave Trotter banged the rubber past goalie Dave Kerr on a pass from Allan Shields. Rangers protested the tally claiming Trotter was in the goal crease.

Hooley Smith, first string centre of Maroons, retired from the game at the end of the second period with a bad charley horse. Bill Miller replaced him.

Bert Connelly, former Moncton Hawk, was not in uniform, his place being taken by Keeling. Connelly has been sent to Philadelphia Ramliners of the Canadian-American League.
