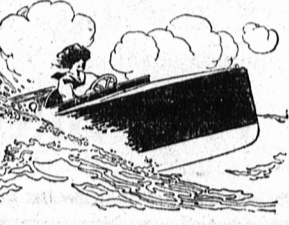

We are having lovely weather at present such a change from the rain and mud of the past few months. I have been exceptionally lucky as yet. About two weeks ago the Germans turned a machine gun on, of course I ducked but a shot from a tree hit me on the side and took a small chip out, another half of an inch and I could have said "Au Revoir" I got an injection of serum to prevent lock-jaw or blood poisoning as the Germans poison some of their bullets, and it has bothered me ten times worse than the wound. One place where we were the Germans were only thirty yards from us and bombs were given and taken. A true instance of where it is better to give than to receive. Well the

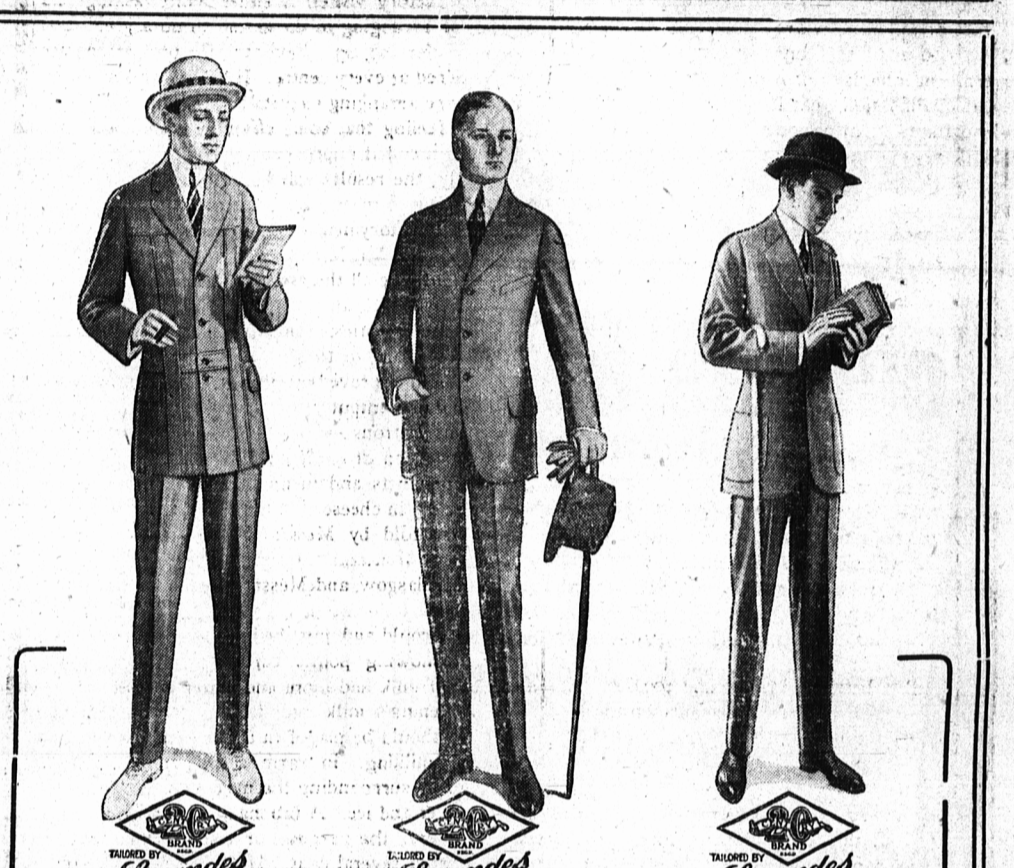
