**SUCCESSFUL DOCTOR.**—The following is taken from the Oakland, California, Maple Leaf:—We had the pleasure of a visit this month from Dr. B. L. Steeves, of Salem, Oregon, one of the most successful physicians in the west. Dr. Steeves is well known in Summerside, P.E.I., where he was educated and grew into young manhood. After leaving home he came west, and by his own untiring efforts succeeded in acquiring the title of M.D. For a number of years he lived in Idaho, and while there, on account of his ability and popularity, was elected Lieutenant-Governor of that state. **KITCHENER RESPONSIBLE FOR HOAX WHICH FOOLED GERMANS.**

LONDON, March 3.—The blubb the famous hoax of the first weeks of the war, which a body of Russian soldiers said to number from 100,000 to 200,000 men was reported to have circled around from Archangel, landed in Scottish ports and had been shipped through at night to reinforce the British force in France, originated with Lord Kitchener himself, according to a statement made by a British officer to a correspondent of the Daily Despatch.

It is a noteworthy fact that although the myth spread like wild fire through the United Kingdom, with any number of witnesses to swear they had seen and talked to the Russians in their native language, the press bureau did not issue an official contradiction for a long period.

The Russian story, says the British officer, was designed to impress the German commanders in Belgium and Northern France, and to keep them in fear of a surprise, either in the rear or on the western flank. It accomplished its purpose, for this dread was real among the German staff, and accounts to some extent for the retreat of General Von Kluck from Paris.

To give color to the report, Lord Kitchener is said to have caused a hundred transports, laden with sundry goods, to be sent from Scottish ports to Archangel, after insuring them in Holland.

And when the British troops were moved from various points in Scotland and the north of England to the Channel ports, he ordered the blinds of the trains to be lowered so as to arouse popular curiosity and speculation.
