The remains of Miss Garnhum were forwarded to her parents' home and the funeral services were held from the Cutcliffe Funeral Home, attended by a wide circle of sorrowing relatives and friends.

During her residence in Black's Harbor the deceased was a valued and active member of the Calvary United Baptist Church where she was especially beloved for her work among the young people. Her Minister, Rev. T. O. Dewolf, then wrote of her Christian virtues and the love and esteem in which she was held.
