POULTRY.—The Crate Fattening of Poultry is the name of the interesting and instructive pamphlet which has been issued by the Live Stock Branch, Ottawa, and which was prepared by T. A. Benson, Dominion Poultry Representative for this Province. It gives full details regarding the construction of fattening crates and the best breeds of chickens for the purpose and their feeding and rationing. It also describes fully the best method of killing, breeding and picking them. The instructions are simply and explicit and it is well illustrated, with carefully prepared cuts. This is the time of year when farmers are fattening their chickens and everyone should have a copy of it. It can be had either from T. A. Benson, or from the Live Stock Branch, Ottawa, or from the local Department of Agriculture, Charlottetown, P. E. I.

BISHOP MORRISON.—In the November issue of The Maple Leaf, of Oakland, California a magazine published in the interest of the people of Nova Scotia and P. E. Island, there appears an interesting article on California's reception to Bishop Morrison of Antigonish. During his stay in Oakland Bishop Morrison was the guest of his brother the Reverend Francis X. Morrison, D.D., rector of St. Joseph's Church, Berkeley. Before leaving for home Bishop Morrison was the guest of honor at a reception given by the Sons and Daughters of the maritime provinces in the Knights of Columbus hall. The address of welcome to His Lordship was given by M. A. McInnis, a former P. E. Islander, and editor of the Oakland Maple Leaf. There was also an address by W. V. Harrington. In his response Bishop Morrison paid a glowing tribute to California and expressed his deep appreciation of the welcome tendered him by the people of the maritime provinces. He praised them for a sturdy character and their loyalty to the ideals set before them in their childhood, and impressed upon them the necessity of continuing the good work they have so nobly begun.

IMPROVEMENT SOCIETY.—The Young People Mutual Improvement Society, Crapaud, held its weekly meeting on Saturday evening last in Lady Fane Hall. The subject of the debate that evening was "Resolved that it is the best interest of Man-kind that the Franchise be extended to Women." After an interesting discussion in which the following persons took part:—Mr. Arling, Mr. John Myers, M.L.A., Mr. Isaac Beer, Dr. Boyer, Mr. Oscar Myers, and Dr. Bell, a vote was taken resulting in the resolution being sustained by one vote. The subject selected for debate for next Saturday night is:—"Resolved that man is the architect of his own fortune rather than a creature of circumstances."

GOOD YEAR.—The Kensington Dairying Association is now issuing its annual report for the past year, which has been a very successful year in many respects. The total number of pounds of milk supplied was 3,341,303, an increase of 465,440 lbs over 1912, and netting the patrons about \$1.00 per hundred lbs., a little lower than last year (\$1.01), this fact being accounted for by a decrease in the average price of cheese and an increase in the average price of hauling. One patron, Mr. Joseph Dawson supplied 41,058 lbs milk for which he received \$410. Another patron, Mr. H. R. Baker, with one cow, after supplying three families with milk, supplied the factory with 5879 lbs for which he received \$58.75.

MOVING PICTURES.—The moving picture men, Mr. R. Cleveland and his assistants were yesterday busily engaged in taking photographs in Charlottetown. Governor Rogers, Premier Matheson, and Mr. W. Frost, U. S. Consul, were photographed in their respective offices. The Premier and members of the government, provincial officials and others, were also photographed on the steps of the Provincial Building. The mayor and the city councillors also posed for a picture during the day. A pretty picture was taken in front of the Canada Exchange of Capt. D. A. McKinnon and Mr. F. R. Newsom, of the Exchange, and others. The Charlottetown Fire Brigade were photographed in action at noon.
