The Japanese Minister in London says that if Russia gets Manchuria, Japan will promptly seize Korea. He admits that this would mean war, but says that it is better for Japan to fight now than after Russia has entrenched herself in the East. Russia would follow the seizure of Manchuria by taking Korea also.

The Ottawa City Council have not yet accepted Mr. Carnegie's offer of \$100,000 for a library on condition of the City finding a site and becoming bound to pay \$7,500 a year for maintenance. A direct motion to accept the offer was defeated by a vote of 12 to 11 in favor of an amendment to refer the offer to the finance committee. What seems likely to be done is to pass a by-law accepting Mr. Carnegie's offer subject to a popular vote thereon.

The date of Easter Sunday in any year is determined in this way: It is the Sunday which follows the full moon which falls upon or next after 21st March. So it becomes possible sometimes for Easter to come as early as 22nd March and sometimes as late as 25th April. Only four times in four hundred years past has Easter occurred at the earliest possible date and only four times in four hundred years has it fallen on the latest possible date. When the full moon falls upon the 21st day of March, that day being also Saturday, the 22nd would be Easter. When the first full moon after the 21st March does not appear till 18th April, that day being also Sunday, Easter would be the following Sunday, on 25th April.

In Shanghai there are six daily native papers and one weekly. The names of these rendered into English are: New Hear Shanghai Paper, Chinese Foreign News, Same News, Soo Chow News, and Chinese Foreign Evening News. They have each a full staff of editors, reporters and correspondents. As there are about 4,000 characters or types each Chinese compositor needs almost room enough to live in for his supply of type. Every office contains its own type foundry and repair shop. Advertisements fill about three fourths of the space in each issue. An American newspaper man who has made a study of the subject credits the Chinese papers with giving their local news in very condensed but graphic and readable style. A reporter is considered capable if he can write a graphic story in 100 characters or less at the rate of five characters per minute. The managing editor receives the princely stipend of a dollar a day.

It will be remembered that shortly after the death of Queen Victoria, Lodge Prince Edward, No. 219 appointed a committee to draft a resolution of condolence re the death of the Queen, and a copy of the resolution beautifully printed was sent to Lord Minto to be forwarded to the Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies. Shortly afterwards a letter was received from the Governor General, acknowledging receipt and stating that it would be forwarded to the King. Last night the following letter was read to the lodge.

OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR GENERAL'S SECRETARY, March 16, 1901. Sir:—In obedience to commands received from His Majesty the King, His Excellency the Governor General desires me to convey to the members of Lodge Prince Edward, Sons of England, His Majesty's heartfelt thanks for the kind expression of sympathy contained in the resolution enclosed in your letter of the 25th ultimo which has been gratefully appreciated by His Majesty and the Royal Family. CITY AND COUNTRY

Guardian Correspondents Everywhere.

A VERY pretty wedding took place in New London, last Wednesday evening at the residence of Mr. James Bernard, Long River, when his daughter Janette was united in marriage to Mr. Robert Edward Johnstone. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Edwin Smith of Kensington. A large number of pretty presents testify to the esteem in which the bride is held.

THE GUARDIAN understands that in a few days a number of the station agents on the P. E. Island R. R. will receive promotion. The arrangement will doubtless result as follows: Mr. D. Montgomery, now agent at Alberton will come to Kensington and Mr. Geo. McMahon of Emerald will go to Alberton. Mr. David Lawson, station agent at St. Peters will take charge at Hunter River and Mr. Neil Campbell of Bradalbane will go to Emerald. Mr. W. A. Cheverie of Mt. Stewart will go to Bradalbane. The younger operators who have been in connection with the road but not in charge of a station will be appointed to St. Peters and Mt. Stewart.

Mr. H. T. Hall, representing the International Correspondence School, Scranton, Pa., whose arrival in the city was announced in yesterday morning's GUARDIAN has decided to take up his residence in the city. For the present he will be found at the Revere and later on if business permits he will open an office. The method of correspondence instruction in the industrial sciences of the International correspondence schools was originated in 1891. Some idea of the extent of the school will be gathered when it is learned that there are two buildings. The larger contains the instruction and accounting departments of the school, is five stories high, covers 6,887 square feet of ground containing 35,000 square feet of floor space. The smaller building contains one of the most modern printing plants in the country equipped with 15 large printing presses employing 125 persons and turns out 4 tons printed matter each week at an annual cost of \$150,000. With each course of instruction valuable works dealing with subject taken by the student are given. The student receives instruction and helps by mail and can set his own time for the termination of the course. Upon completion of the first book of instructions examination papers are forwarded and 80 per cent must be made before the second book is taken up. Thorough examination and correction of the work of the student is made. The calendar of the institution includes over 40 different branches comprising all the higher branches with many of the lower. In conversation with Mr. Hall the writer learned that nearly 30 persons in Charlottetown are studying in connection with the institution all of whom are delighted. Those desiring the names of students or wanting information are asked to call upon Mr. Hall at the Revere.
