B. C. GOVERNMENT ELECTION SCANDAL

The Attorney-General implicated in a \$15,000 C.N.R. Bribe.

Fails to Attend Court to Give Evidence.

Money Spent in Motors etc.

VANCOUVER, B. C.—"Did you pay, between September 7 and 14, to the Hon. M. A. MacDonald, in your office, in Vancouver, the proceeds of a check for \$15,000?"

"Yes," was the question and the reply of Mr. Robert MacKenzie at noon today toward the close of his examination regarding the charge brought by J. S. Cowper against the Attorney-General.

Dr. MacKenzie further said that he had got the money and placed it in the Hotel Vancouver for safekeeping over night. He got it next morning, took it over to his own office, called up Hon. M. A. MacDonald on the telephone and Mr. MacDonald called at his office by arrangement, and got the money. It was the \$15,000, less exchange on the check—the amount being approximately \$14,950.

Dr. MacKenzie was called to the stand immediately after court opened. He said he could absolutely deny that he took any money of the Canadian Northern Railway, September 13, or any other date, or placed the money in the safe of the Hotel Vancouver over night. He denied that he had acted at any time as the agent or representative of the company in any such transaction.

In reply to further questions, he said that if he had any knowledge of the private affairs of any party in Vancouver he would ask the commissioners that he be protected from these questions.

S. L. Taylor at once took the ground for the defense, that this put an end to the inquiry.

Half an hour was spent in arguing regarding the proper form of questions and disposing of Taylor's objections. The witness appeared to give qualified denials regarding the fifteen thousand dollars until finally S. Woods asked him if he had given the proceeds of the fifteen thousand check to MacDonald.

"Yes, in my office," replied the witness, who had apparently been basing his previous denials on the fact that it was not fifteen thousand dollars even money, but that amount with exchange between Vancouver and Winnipeg deducted.

MacKenzie admitted that the amount was between \$14,500 and \$15,000. He recounted how he had left the money in the safe at the Hotel Vancouver over night, and next morning called up MacDonald by arrangement and MacDonald came to his office and got the money.

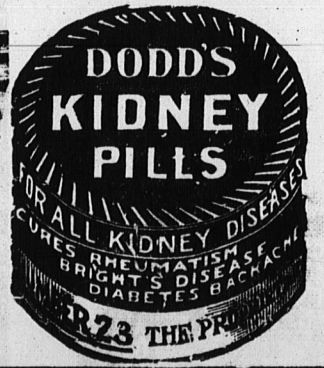
