At its conclusion the baskets were auctioned by Edward Ryan who was most successful in his work. The secretary and the committee as well as the people of Fort Augustus are to be congratulated on their new hall which is one of the neatest and most comfortable in the Province.

JOHN Wheatley who returned home on Saturday last from a business trip to Sydney, says that times are quite brisk there and the prospects for its future seem very bright. While in Sydney Mr. Wheatley met the following Islanders, who are all doing well: Messrs P. Blake, T. J. Morris, Chester Acorn, W. Pickard, J. R. Larkins, J. P. Joy, William and Garnet Ball, Charles Henry, E. Bearsto, and McCoubrey and Bullman. The latter are doing a large trade with P. E. I. but Mr. Wheatley says that 75% of the beef, pork, poultry etc. consumed in Sydney comes from Ontario, and P. E. I. is losing this amount of trade which surely belongs to this Province for want of better shipping facilities, rates, etc. Mr. Wheatley on his way home spent three hours at Mulgrave inspecting the Railway Ferry, and while in conversation with one of the head officers was informed that the ferry has been very successful since it started, and although at times great quantities of ice came down the straits and the current is very strong yet the Scotia has no difficulty in making her way through it. The Scotia carries 21 loaded cars each trip and the heavier she is loaded the better work she performs. She has not missed a day since she was put on the service, a little over a year ago. There is talk of the Dominion Government building a bridge across from Mulgrave to Point Tupper, a distance of one mile. When this is done the Government will have no need for the Scotia at that place. Mr. Wheatley thinks the Scotia would do good service between Cape Traverse and Cape Tormentine, if we had good dockage accommodations; those points, for eleven months in the year if not twelve, and as the future of this Province depends to a very great extent upon her transportation facilities, it behooves every farmer and every merchant to urge upon the Federal Government the absolute necessity of building a bridge across the North River and a wide gauge branch railway through Cornwall, New Haven, Crapaud, etc., to connect with a Railway Ferry at the Capes. If this were done our mail service, our passenger accommodation, and our transportation facilities would be far in advance of the conditions which exist at the present time. Our people would then realize more for their produce as we would then have intercourse with the best American and Canadian markets at all seasons of the year. We could load cars with potatoes, fish, poultry, beef, lamb, etc., today and without any transfer from car to steamer and from steamer to car, like we now have to the disadvantage of all, and tomorrow it could be landed in the best American or Canadian markets to reap the best price, which are now kept from our reach for want of better shipping accommodations and which the Federal Government promised this Province at the time of confederation but as yet has not fulfilled.
