ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

THERE was no crossing at the Capes yesterday.

The market was fairly well attended yesterday. Eggs had fallen to 16; and 18 cents. Owing principally to the fact that they cannot be shipped.

REV. J. H. HECTOR will lecture in the Hazelbrook Church on March 17th instead of March 10th as previously announced. On March 10th he will speak at Victoria.

THURSDAY at noon Edward Harden of this city shot a large fox near Southport. His hounds started the chase at 8.30 o'clock and were after the fox nearly four hours.

YESTERDAY while John Pidgeon and John Wise were hauling sand from White's Point, North River, they saw a flock of wild geese. This is one of the first indications of spring.

THE death took place at Georgetown yesterday of Robert Broughton for many years keeper of the Court House at Georgetown. Mr. Broughton had reached the very old age of 103 years.

THE Carnival at the Rink last night was not as largely attended as the previous one, but those who were present enjoyed themselves thoroughly. Excellent music was furnished by Worth's Band.

THE Postal Department have made arrangements to have the most important part of the mail now at Pictou transferred to the Island via the Capes. There is now about 12,000 lbs of mail at Pictou awaiting transportation.
