Noted Explorer Back From North

In connection with the application of the dairy industry, the peculiar part taken in tariff board proceedings by Messrs. Darby and Deachman was brought into relief. The former represents the Council of Agriculture while the latter, in so far as he has identified that "Consumers' League" under whose name he operates, appears to have some connection with representatives of agriculture in parliament. And they were before the Tariff Board assailing the claim of one important branch of agriculture for such treatment in the home market as would permit it to survive. Bona fide representatives of Canadian industry bringing application before the board have submitted to a good deal of criticism from this quarter, but of late there has been a tendency to challenge the status of Mr. Deachman. He has been asked on two or three occasions recently to disclose his standing in his attacks on legislators for tariff revision. Some legitimate curiosity has been voiced as to the identity of the "Consumers' League." From the not overly eager replies of Mr. Deachman, it would appear to have its existence in the persons of two or three obscure members of the House of Commons. Obviously, of course, Mr. Deachman and these obscure members of the House of Commons no more represent the consumers of Canada than the historic three tailors of Tooley Street represented the people of England. It is safe to say that the majority of the consumers of Canada would be very far from subscribing to most of the personal submissions he places on the record of the board. Nevertheless, as much of the time of the proceedings is devoted to his purpose as might properly be the case were he authorized to speak for a considerable section of the community.

The soloists and Mr. Wilfred Booth had played for the song.

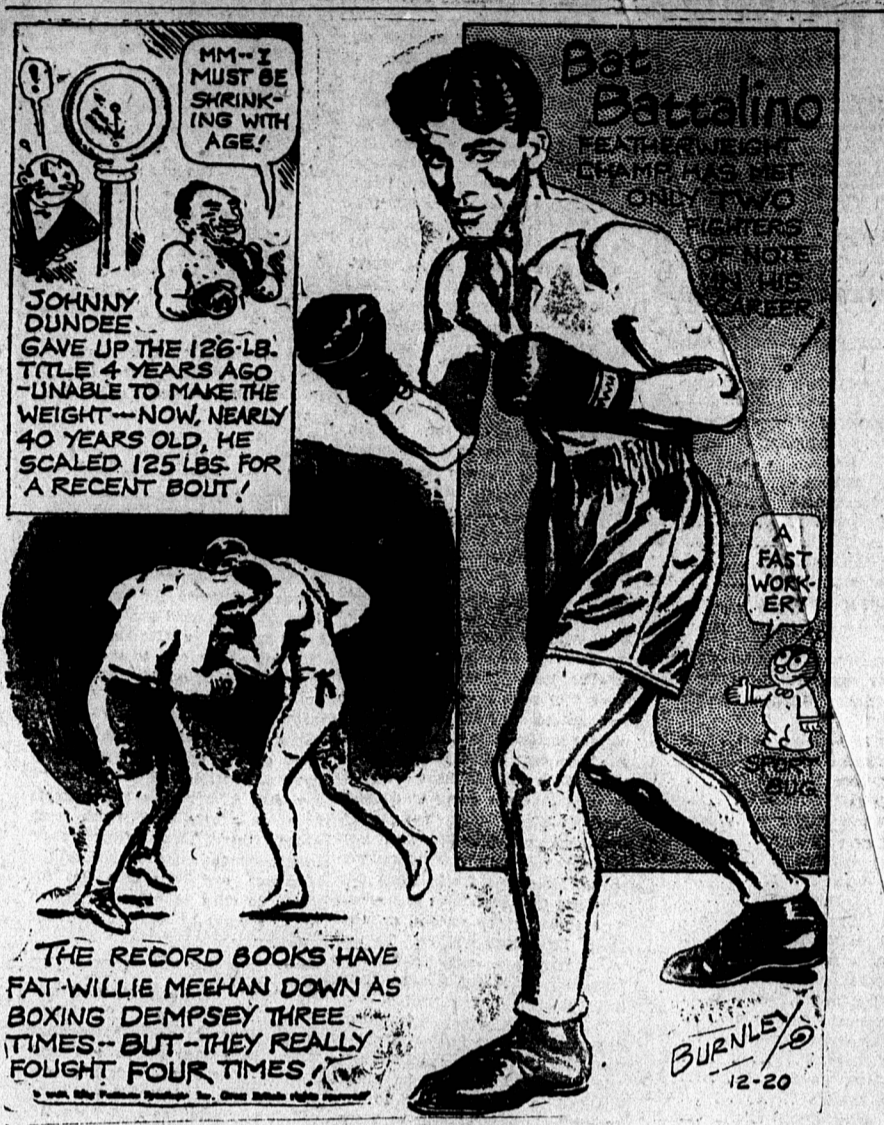
Special services next week to be addressed by Mr. J. H. Geldhart of Toronto, late of China.

THE RECORD BOOKS HAVE FAT-WILLIE MEEHAN DOWN AS BOXING DEMPSEY THREE TIMES—BUT—THEY REALLY FOUGHT FOUR TIMES.

By winning a world's fight championship "transfer," the most expert critics at the ring-side agreed that, Battalino, Hartford, Conn., featherweight, achieved an unprecedented feat in sport annals. While he actually won the title from Andre Routis, it was really a managerial coup that gave him the chance to box the fast-fading Frenchman. The managers of the latter (ring-wise New Yorkers) knew Routis was on the skids, especially after Al Singer knocked him out in a mixed-weight bout. So a close friend of the Routis managerial board "bought in" on Battalino after the latter secured considerable publicity through outpointing Al Brown. A Routis-Battalino title fight was arranged easily and the Hartford boy won the championship in a home-town ten-rounder.

While some criticism is heard of the "synthetic" nature of that championship "transfer," the most expert critics at the ring-side agreed that, Battalino, Hartford, Conn., featherweight, achieved an unprecedented feat in sport annals. Before outpointing Routis and Al Brown, Battalino was merely a Connecticut sensation after stopping a half dozen comparatively unknown featherweights.

While Battalino won a world's title in his second big time showing consider the case of Johnny Dundee, who battled more than a decade against great opposition to win that same crown. The Scotch-Wop abandoned the title four years ago because he found it so difficult to make 126 pounds. Slipping sadly, Dundee still manages to box every now and then. He now finds himself making 125 pounds easily, but time has interred all his title hopes.

Willie Meehan, who will be famous forever as one of the two men officially credited with whipping Jack Dempsey before the latter became champion, insists he fought the Manassa marvel four instead of three times. Willie claims he loked Jack twice—once so badly that Jack Kerns kept it out of the records! Like Dempsey, Meehan is now in the show business, specializing in the scenic end of the profession. He's not slumming and—Willie insists that he and Gene Tunney are the only persons who truthfully can boast of having outboxed Dempsey twice!

As a matter of fact, Meehan boxed Dempsey six times in the dim days when Jack was just a young ham-and-beaner but only four of those clashes were ever of enough importance to be even mentioned in the press.

Great Racing On Summerside Ice

Four Hundred Spectators See Fine Afternoon's Sport.

SUMMERSIDE, Feb. 23—The best winter sport at Summerside for very many years took place on the harbor ice on Saturday afternoon, when in the four classes twenty horses turned to the word. There were over five hundred eager sportsmen at the meet and every heat was a closely contested race, and at the finish of many of them a blanket would have covered the first three horses. The ice was in excellent condition, very fast time was made.

In the Class A Trot, the first race called, Peter Will Tell was a bit unsteady in the first two heats, but after settling down he soon took command of the field and won the race with comparative ease, although the other horses were very closely bunched at the finish. There were four starters in the Class A Pace and all got away to a good start. The race was won quite handsly by Jessica the Great. Mickey Aubrey seemed to be off color and Cyril F. J. did not appear to have quite enough speed to take command of the situation. Bud Hal apparently was short of work.

In the Class B Pace quite a lot of rivalry was created by Fernwood Aubrey, who having broken a hobble in the first heat came to life in a surprising manner in the next two heats, but was very closely pressed by Capt. Calkins and Byng Girl. James Aubrey had rather bad breaking luck after winning the first heat quite handsly.

The Class C Trot and Pace brought out the largest field of the day and furnished excellent racing.

Lady Helena, although winning the first heat was very closely pressed by Helen S. M. The second heat she seemed to have plenty of reserve and the race developed into a real competition for second and third positions, being finally won in the last few feet by Kentucky Jewel. The remainder of the field was closely bunched and Chicago Girl ably driven by Robert Phillips is a wonderfully improved mare. The summary:
