United States Steel

A despatch from New York states that United States Steel should become a leader again when the general industrial list is ready to move forward. It is unusually popular and on its past record is a logical feature during strong periods. Investment buying has been in progress. In addition, one of the most important banking interests added a good sized block to outright holdings within 10 days.

Canadian Pacific

Credit must be given to the management of the Canadian Pacific Railway for the faith that it has shown in Canada and it may be taken for granted that this faith, in time, will be amply rewarded. The Canadian Pacific Railway's management in the past has always been known for its shrewd judgment of both economic and financial conditions in the country, and every indication points to the fact that the present policy of the company warrants the belief by all Canadians of the ultimate "growing up" of Canada to take its place as one of the leading countries in the world.

Winnipeg Electric

The technical position of Winnipeg Electric is one of the most bullish factors in its immediate situation. This company has extensive plans for the future in connection with the huge Northwestern Power development and a careful study shows that the natural increase in the demand for power in the city of Winnipeg and its suburbs averaged at present about 20,000 h. p. per annum, exclusive of any abnormal demand from mining camps, manufacturers of paper, etc. Based upon this established demand, in the year 1932, there will be required 60,000 h. p. more than in 1928. Allowing for the earnings from only half of this, or 30,000 h. p. although it would be fair to estimate a larger amount, and taking \$30 per h. p. as a fair average price to be realized by the Winnipeg Electric (this price takes into consideration the load factor, etc.) there will be a sum of about \$900,000 available to take care of \$600,000 interest on the \$1,000,000 of bonds outstanding, the \$300,000 dividend on preferred stock payable to the Winnipeg Electric and administration charges which should not exceed \$100,000.

Shawinigan

There is a considerable amount of comment on the Street about the clause which was voted on by the shareholders of the Shawinigan Water & Power Company at the annual meeting held here last week. The clause in question reads as follows: "Shareholders also authorize the creation of stock warrants designed to retain control in the hands of the present management."

Interpreted by a leading powerman of the city, this empowering clause has been obtained in order to permit the management to issue management share warrants to keep control of Shawinigan forever in their hands, and the hands of their self-appointed successors.
