Some of the men clearing up the high water, the lobster fisheries and fish hatchery employed their quota of men during the early spring and summer. Then came the tearing down of the old fall which kept a large number of men employed for over a month, the beginning work on the new fall building the completion of which will probably occupy till New Years, the laying of several new concrete sidewalks and the complete repairing of the wooden ones now remaining, besides extensive repairs to the High School building all of which have kept our laboring men busy all summer. Among other evidence of progress and prosperity, we might mention a splendid new dwelling house on Water Street near the Railway Station built by Mr. Ben Stewart of the P. E. I. R., and several private residences extensively repaired, Georgetown is not a "finished" town by any means.—&
