Princess. She was brought up in a Royal home, but a home in which the frugal ways held the highest place. Her mother, the Princess Christian, had taught her how to live in the most economical ways, to make their own gowns, bake their own bread, and to manage their household according to the strictest principles of domestic economy. At the same time she received a thorough education in those artistic arts which may adorn even the humblest life. She was a skilled musician, a very fine painter, a linguist of no mean order. Her personal beauty was the talk of every European Court, and no one was surprised when the announcement was made that this beautiful and practical princess was betrothed to the Heir Apparent of the British Empire, the Prince of Wales, which thronged the streets of London on that never-to-be-forgotten day when as a girl of nineteen summers she made her journey through the streets of that grey old metropolis with an escort that she had had in her early years as the daughter of the King's daughter from over the seas captivated every heart with that charming smile which it was her duty to wear until her dying day. The strong affection which she grew through the years to a reverence and respect in a measure unprecedented in British history. She had to serve a long apprenticeship before she became Queen. During the thirty-eight years of her reign the Prince of Wales, she never murmured or plined, but continued to win the hearts by her beauty and charm of manner, the unaffected simplicity and the unflinching kindness of her great heart. Her skill in domestic affairs and her spirit endeared her greatly to Queen Victoria and so when that great Queen passed on to her reward it was with the consciousness that the consort of her son King Edward VII. would be a British woman at home and abroad by her thorough knowledge of the problems of family life. And so it was that during these ten years from 1901 to 1910 when she reigned the highest exponent of the domestic art and proved a most worthy consort to him who will ever be remembered in British history as Edward the Peace Maker. She performed the exacting duties of her exalted station with a gracefulness and a charm which have never been known to fail her, and she proved the words of Tennyson, who with prophetic vision declared that she would be the "Blessed Bride of a blissful heir."

From the stage of a blissful heir she passed on to all these responsibilities of life which ever have the blessing of God upon them, and which gave encouragement to a St. Paul when he remembered that he was on the faith, Timothy, "I am not on a mother but a grandmother." Queen Alexandra became a great blessing to her children and to the fourth generation, and her children to call her blessed. In all the relationships of life she was a perfect exemplar for all the people of her Kingdom, and during her long life she abundantly blessed never a day passed without some deed of kindness done; or some activity spent in the furtherance of some worthy cause.

Although long past the allotted span we never thought of the Dowager Queen as an aged woman. She has given to all ages the secret of how to grow old gracefully, and that secret is found in the thought she always gave to others. The beauty of her countenance and the grace of her figure have been so long remembered upon even the last time she appeared in the streets of London at the advanced age of four score years.

Although she never visited Canada I make bold to say that no part of her was dearer to me than her heart than this great land. It is recorded that when her noble grandson, our present Prince of Wales returned from his first Canadian tour no one was more interested in all his ventures than his dear old grandmother. She never forgot Canada's devotion to the Mother Country during the Great War, and was ever proud of the fact that Canada sent the bravest of her sons to fight shoulder to shoulder with the best regiments of the Homeland. She knew from the fact that no person command of Major P. W. McNeven of the great army then put into

Shipments By The Potato Growers' Association

Officials of the Potato Growers' Association, interviewed by a Guardian representative yesterday stated that the number of bushels of potatoes already shipped by the Association this fall has by far exceeded any previous season's shipments ever made by them. Upwards of 350,000 bushels have left the Garden of the Gulf by water, and have gone forward by rail to time of writing fifty car loads, and the work is still going on. Asked if any more steamers would load here, it was stated that the Association considered it unwise to take further risks in shipping by water on account of having no frost-proof warehouses in which to assemble the cargoes, which course was deemed advisable fearing a repetition of the 1922 season when they suffered severe losses from a heavy frost which set in around the middle of November, therefore since the sailing of the "Wagland" the Association has been making shipments by rail as fast as transport can be made.

The following steamers have been loaded by the Potato Growers' Association: The first steamer loaded was the S. S. Buehand, she sailed October 26th with 21,000 sacks. She was followed by the S. S. Bessegon the first week in November, November 11th with 20,000 sacks. These three steamers destination was Norfolk, Virginia. The S. S. Orkild sailed November 18th for Brooklyn, Long Island carrying a cargo of 25,000 sacks. The S. S. Wagland completed loading on November 22nd and sailed November 23rd. This was the largest cargo of all aggregating with seed and table stock practically 30,000 large sacks destination Norfolk, Virginia. Part of the Wagland's cargo was for re-shipment to Long Island.

of our fathers known of old. Let us of our far flung battle line. Beneath whose awful hands we hold. Dominion over palm and pine. Lord God of Hosts be with us yet. Lest we forget, lest we forget. After singing the hymn "Now the Laborer's Task is o'er and the Benediction, Mr. F. T. Watkins played "The Dead March in Saul," which was well received.
