A large delegation of the Provincial Temperance Alliance waited upon Premier Hazzard yesterday morning at ten o'clock and presented the resolutions passed at their convention, on Tuesday and also the following resolution, which is not included in the report of the convention which appears on another page of today's Guardian. Resolved, That the Government's attention be and is hereby called to Section 1 of the "Act to Impose a Direct Tax on Commercial Travellers," which permits, under license of \$200, travellers coming into the Province for the sale of liquors against the spirit and intent of the Provincial Prohibition Act. The President of the Alliance Rev. A. E. Burke adverted to the fact that the late Premier Peters had passed legislation and stood loyally behind it, on behalf of Temperance. The present Cabinet is largely the same that supported the late Premier and the Alliance wished to know if the present Premier stood in the same position as his predecessor. The Premier replied that in so far as he could he had always supported the Alliance and intended to support it, and give temperance people all assistance. He took down the recommendation of the delegations and promised to give them his sympathetic consideration and that of the Government. The delegation was much pleased with the interview and expressed their appreciation. President Burke thanked the Premier for his expressions of encouragement. The delegation consisted of so many members that they overflowed the Council Chamber, in which the interview was held. Its size was a matter of surprise evidently, and although large, was as its spokesman truly said only an infinitesimal representation of the great body of temperance phalanx in this Province—a body now strong enough to compel its wishes with any Government.

The Rev. Dougald Neil McPhail, M. A., B. D., Ph. D., who was inducted minister of Mt. Stewart Presbyterian Congregation last night at 8.30 p. m. is a native of Kintyre, Highlands of Scotland and was brought up in the church of Scotland and came to America when quite a youth. At 14 years of age he had completed his high school course and was prepared for the University. He studied in Hillsdale College, Michigan; Taylor University, Indiana; Reade Theological Seminary, Indiana, and the University of Glasgow, Scotland. Dr. McPhail's university and divinity courses of study covered a period of ten years. After completing a four years' college course he graduated with the degree, B. L. (Bachelor of Literature) in 1887. He spent three years in Divinity and during this time took post-graduate study in arts and graduated with the M. A., and B. D. degrees. He afterwards took a three years' postgraduate course and won the degree, Ph. D., (Doctor of Philosophy). It was long after his return from Scotland that he came to the Island on invitation to serve in the Kirk Presbytery for a time. During part of his recent stay in Scotland he served as assistant minister preaching in Gaelic and English. A little over three years ago he had completed his postgraduate course he was ordained by the Presbytery of Flint. His work on the Island has been highly appreciated. Seldom has a man received a more hearty and unanimous call from a congregation than Dr. McPhail has received from this large and important congregation of Mt. Stewart and it is believed that his pastorate will be one of success and profit to Mt. Stewart. Dr. McPhail has won the esteem of many and has made many friends on the Island.

Nova Scotia is the best market for Nova Scotia coal. This is indicated by the figures from the mines report according to the report of amounts of provincial coal sold in the different markets were as follows: Nova Scotia (byland) 1,554,229 (by sea) 288,190—total 1,842,419 tons; Quebec, 1,709,092; United States, 616,312; New Brunswick, 427,128; Newfoundland, 146,502; E. Island, 77,489; Mexico, 7,531; West Indies, 2,598; other countries, 12,483; bunker, 204,572. The bulk of the United States and Newfoundland and all the Mexican shipments were from Cape Breton county, as well as all the bunker. The St. Lawrence shipments from Cape Breton totaled 1,288,926 and the Nova Scotia sales amounted to 1,195,201 tons.

The automobiles and sheep-killing dogs are exercising the people of other provinces than this judging by the following extract from a rather breezy letter to the Farm & Livestock: "I can well remember the time when a combination of a skittish horse and a bicycle was a nerve-wrecking proposition; but that time is gone and even a very old fashioned horse would be ashamed to be frightened at a bicycle these days. So take courage, farmers, wives, daughters, aunts and cousins; handle your horse right the first few times it meets an automobile, don't get frightened yourself, and if you have your eye open and your horse in hand, as you should, death and destruction won't be likely to follow. I do not own an automobile, and unless Carnegie, in place of handing out a library to some town, gives me one, I am not likely to; still, I think that a man, even if he is right enough to run an auto, has some right thinking farmer. How I, through my sheep, have suffered from miserable curs that were not worth the stone one should tie to their lean necks to draw them. There are decent dogs, lots of them, but they are never running round the roads, night and day seeking what they can destroy. Little good dog-sense as these curs have, their owners usually have less; therefore, I hope you will keep the question talked over occasionally, until they either learn something, or will be forced to take advantage of the wisdom of others."

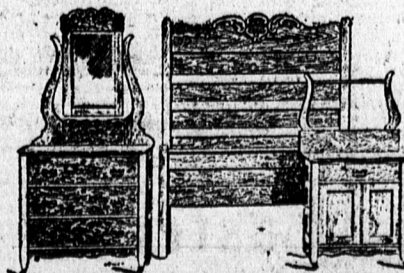
