A "DEMONSTRATION"

By W. S. Louson. (Representative of Greenfields Limited, P. E. I.) Thus, briefly it happened this way while travelling my usual rounds. There is a good deal of human nature in the whole of us, and some incidents in our lives are not easily forgotten.

To demonstrate this assertion the following circumstance (never to be forgotten by the writer) happened some months ago. It was winter time, the sleigh bells were jingling merrily and the place Prince Edward Island. For a number of years I have had the honor of representing the largest general Wholesale Dry Goods Firm in Canada, and upon this special occasion had my samples opened up, ready for business.

As we were talking together one of the clerks came over from the store and said, "A lady is very anxious to see you, sir, at once." Picking up his cane my friend said, "I suppose I must go over," so we all went together, the store being only a short distance away. We were not kept in suspense very long about the stranger and her mission.

A tall, slim, well-dressed lady stepped forward. "Mr. Corset Co. of and wish to demonstrate to (here opening her sample grip) you the advantages of our line of corsets above many other lines." Taking out a fur lined cape or coat, and displaying a beautiful tailor-made dress of black material fitted over an up-

to-date form, our lady traveller commenced to demonstrate intelligently to all present, her line of samples. Taking up one of those medium long line of corsets with the garter attachments, our lady demonstrator placed the corsets outside the black background, thus surrounding the corset territory. The demonstrator then showed by several demonstrations the advantages of her line of goods by sitting down on a chair and other methods, assuring those present that the sample shown was similar to the one she was wearing herself. 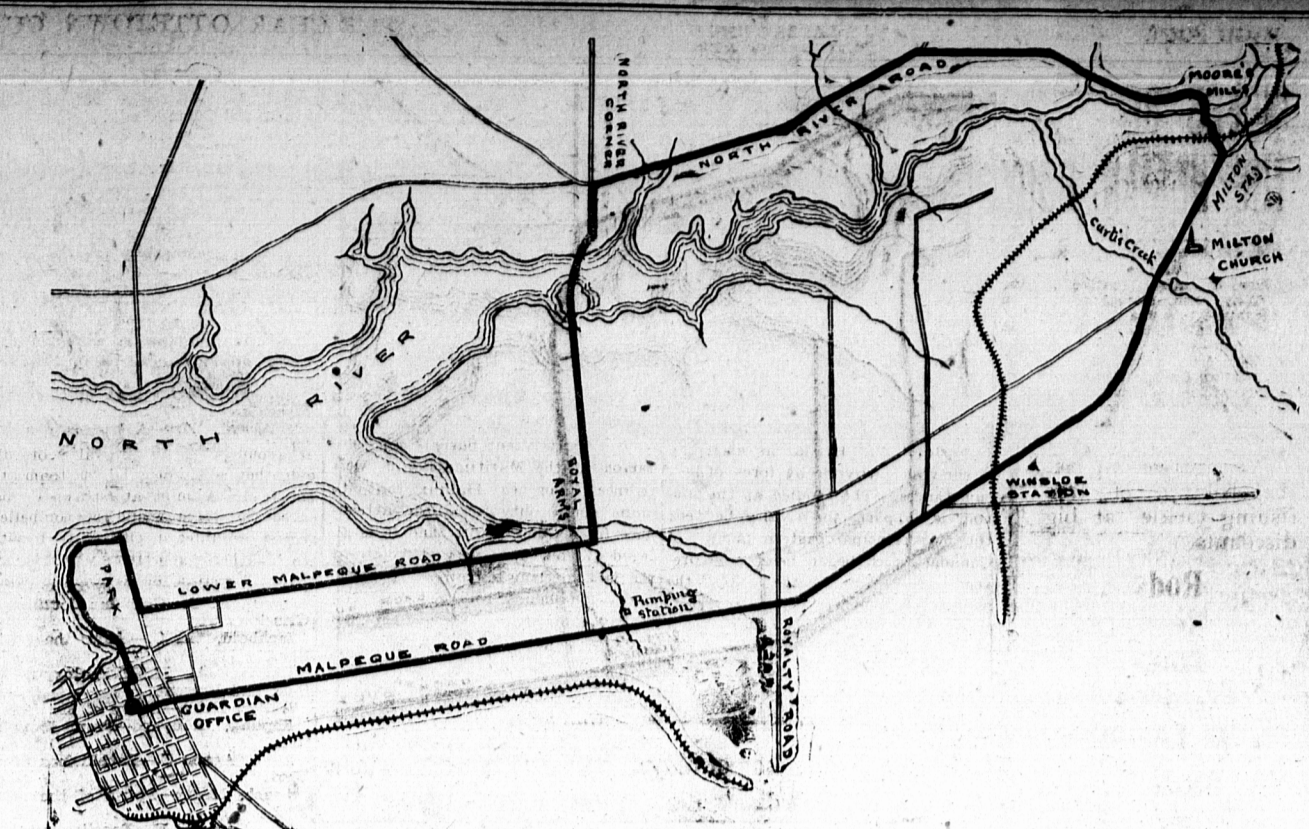

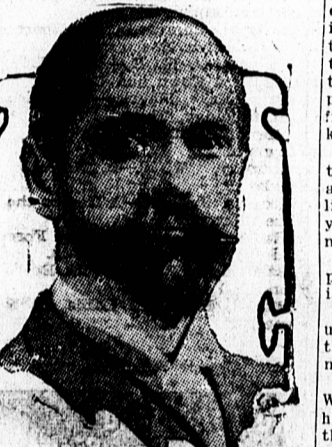

WILL MEN OF FUTURE LIVE 100 YEARS?

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Aug. 20.—Everybody ought to live to be 100 years old. It is just as easy to live to be 100 as not, if you know how, according to Prof. Irving Fisher, professor of political economy at Yale university. Prof. Fisher is a world authority on health, and believes fully he will live to be 100, 110, perhaps 120. Roused by the words of ex-President Roosevelt to the convention of national resources, Prof. Fisher got busy and has just completed a working plan of passing the century mark. This plan is presented here for the first time.



It will be noted that Prof. Fisher's recipe on how to live to be 100 is a combination of old medical theories and new discoveries in the science of health.
