The outer market was dull, oats selling at fifty cents a bus, for white and fifty-five for black, hay at nine to nine dollars and fifty a ton for pressed and from fifty to fifty-five for loose. Straw sold at six dollars a ton for pressed and thirty cents a cwt for loose. Eggs sold at eighteen cents a dozen and butter at seventeen to eighteen cents a pound.

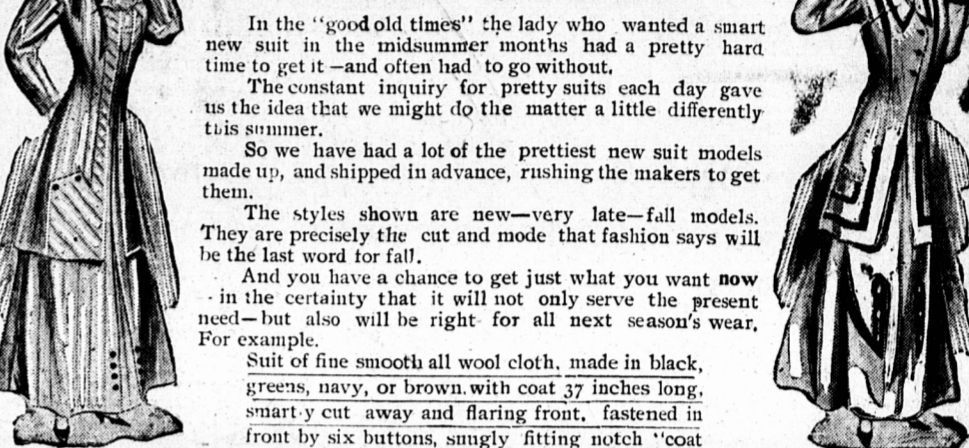
